Judging from the efforts now being made to promote safety and sanity in driving it is altogether probable that within the next few years the world will see many radical extensions in public control over motoring.

New York already is considering banishing private cars from the more congested business areas. Even now limitation of parking areas in the downtown section of all big cities foreshadows the day when all cities, in lieu of some other way of meeting the problem, may have to consider limitation of traffic in certain localities.

Engineers and architects specializing in business construction already must keep in mind the special problems involved in the constantly increasing use of motor cars. In fact, it is altogether possible that the cities of the future will be driven by the automobile to radical changes in street widths, highway approaches and general plan which we of today can only dimly foresee.

Compulsory Arbitration Bill Passes in Rome

ROME, Mar. 12. (AP)—Compulsory arbitration of all labor disputes is required in a bill passed by the Italian senate last night. The measure was introduced by the Fascist government and Premier Mussolini in a speech supported it. It was adopted by a vote of 129 to 27.

Big business and labor must cooperate in order to make a nation happy and prosperous, the premier said. He asserted that capitalists and humble working men were valuable assets to the country but the workman must be conscious of the necessity for national discipline.

WINS RACE WITH DEATH

SAN FRANCISCO, Mar. 12. (AP)—The traffic cops permitted a machine to come through to San Francisco from Salinas at top speed last night, because it was racing with death and they wanted to see it win. Salinas is 125 miles to the south.

The machine was an ambulance and it carried Mary Hozzine, age four, who is suffering from pneumonia. It started late last night and arrived at the University of California at 3 a. m. today. The child was well alive, but its condition is serious.

INDIAN, HELD KILLER, FREED

EUREKA, Cal., Mar. 12. (AP)—A verdict of not guilty was returned by a jury today in the case of Jack Ryan, half breed, who had been accused of the murder of Carmen Wagner, 14 year old beauty parlor attendant.

The finding of Henry Sweet of Eureka lying dead beside his auto with a bullet through his head on a lonely road in the Coyote Flat region on October 10, 1925, led to the finding several days later of the body of Miss Wagner, who had been accompanied by Sweet on a hunt near her old home in the flat. The girl had been carried or dragged several miles from the place where Sweet was found, and then killed and placed in a shallow grave. Nearby was her dog Pronto in another grave, and her bright-hued hat.

The murder of Sweet and the disappearance of the girl had led to a state wide search and one of the most absorbing mysteries in the criminal history of the state.

STANFIELD BILL HEARING AGREED TO BY SENATOR

ROSEBURG, Ore., Mar. 12. (AP)—The congressional committee on public lands will arrange for a hearing on Senator Stanfield's bill, providing for reimbursement to Oregon counties for lost taxes on grant lands, whenever the time is most convenient for the delegation appointed at the county judges' meeting held in Roseburg yesterday, according to a telegram received this morning from Senator Stanfield. A message was sent to him last night stating that a delegation had been officially appointed to represent the 18 Oregon counties interested in the bill and he replied by wire this morning that the hearing would be granted at any time convenient for the delegation. He urged that complete evidence of the local situation be compiled, together with data showing the need for government advances.

INDIAN CHILDREN NO LONGER TO RECEIVE FEDERAL LAND

PENDLETON, Mar. 12. (AP)—Allotments of land on the Umatilla Indian reservation to Indian children will not be made in the future, the last here being allotted last fall. Hereafter children born on the reservation will receive no land except that inherited from their parents, according to information from the United States Indian field service. A total of 25 allotments have been made. The present Indian population on the reservation is 1117.

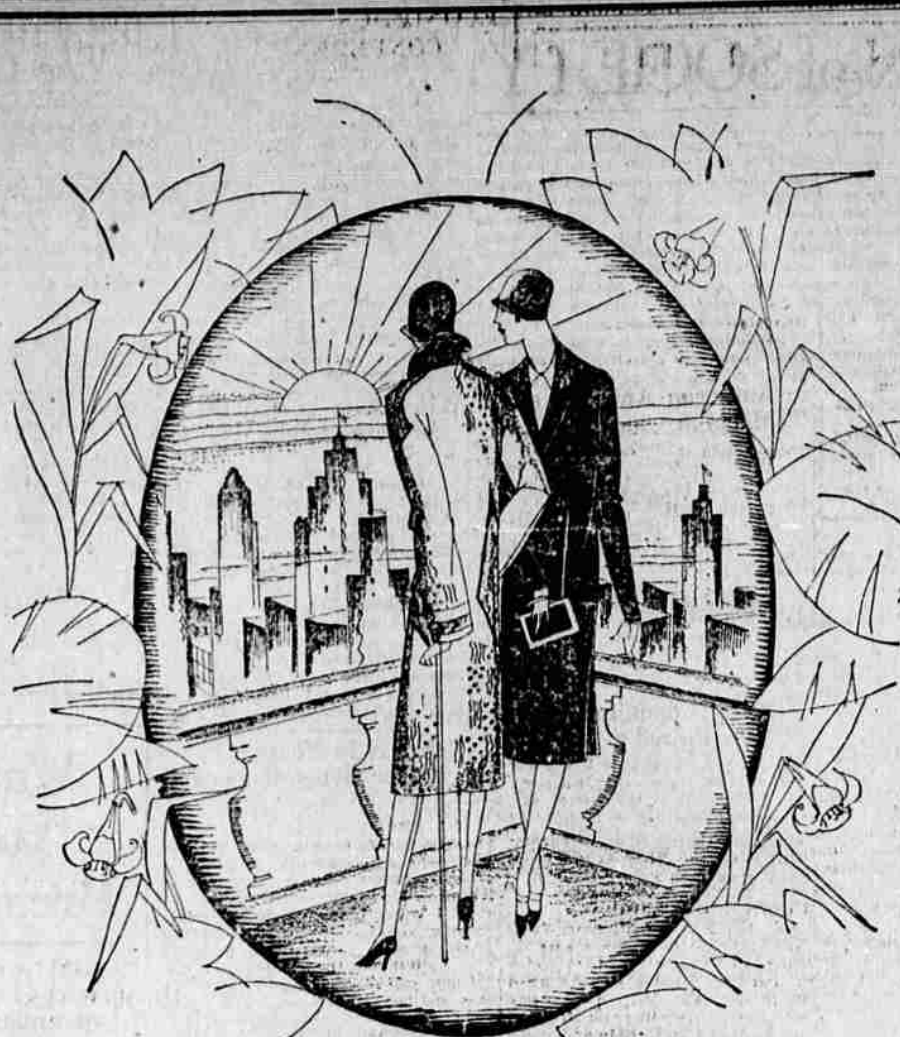
