SPUD PRICES ARE BOOSTED

PORTLAND, Ore., Mar. 12. (AP)—Slightly higher prices at Pacific northwest shipping points is causing some interest in the local potato trade. Considerable eastern demand received at Yakima, has brought top grades up to \$57 a ton. The ruling price hovers around \$52 to \$56 a ton for United States No. 1 grade.

Combination grades still offered around \$47 to \$52 with a No. 2 item ranging from \$43 to \$45. The moderate demand at Yakima up to the present time has been largely for commercial and No. 2 grade. Local dealers do not look for any great improvement in potato values the rest of this season. State Market Agent C. E. Spencer believes that farmers will profit little by holding their stocks longer.

Indications are that certified seed potatoes are going to be scarce and high priced this spring. Sales already made have been at high levels and a shortage of certified stock will probably force the market higher as the demand gets into full swing.

STOCK PRICES FORGE STEADILY AHEAD IN STREET

NEW YORK, Mar. 12. (By the Associated Press)—Despite intermittent profit-taking and bear selling, stock prices forged steadily ahead today with practically all groups purchasing in the advance. Early gains of 1 to 7 points were recorded by scores of rail and industrial shares with pool operations again playing an important part in the day's trading. Delaware and Hudson led the rail group by soaring over six points to 17 1/2, the highest price since 1912. Other rails were bid up on the prospects of increased dividends which appear justified in many cases by the high rate of current earnings.

The closing was strong. Delaware and Hudson extended its rise to almost 8 points and Nickel Plate to 6 1/2, while Baltimore and Ohio, Lackawanna and Chesapeake and Ohio moved forward at a swift pace. Total sales approximated 1,600,000 shares.

WOOL MARKET.

BOSTON, Mar. 12. (AP)—The Commercial Bulletin will say tomorrow:

"Trading in wool has been of a most desultory nature and then only at the expense of prices in the domestic markets, during the past week. The foreign markets, however, have again afforded a sharp contrast, prices prevailing abroad both on the primary and secondary markets being against the buyer for the most part and especially so on merino wools. London opened fully as strong as expected even low and medium grades being cross-bred being against the buyer. Since the opening values have been fairly maintained. In the west, little in the way of new wool business has been done. A little early shorn Idaho mixed wool has been sold at 24 cents. Arizona sales are affected mostly at 28 to 40 cents for the best wools.

"The goods market responds but slowly, although some few worsted mills have secured a fair volume of business on a low profit margin.

"Mohair is quiet but steady. Oregon eastern No. 1 staples \$1.20 to \$1.22; fine and fine medium combing \$1.10 to \$1.15; coarse combing \$1.00; Valley No. 1 \$1.00 to \$1.05.

APPLES.

SAN FRANCISCO, Mar. 12. (AP)—(Federal State Market News Service)—Cold storage in San Francisco were holding 146,924 boxes of apples on March 11, 1926 against a total of 158,718 one week previous to that date.

Comparative holdings for one year ago amounted to 132,069 boxes. The movement of apples has hardly been up to expectations and a weaker feeling has existed for some little time with some decline in prices. Winesaps and Arkansas Blacks were noticeably weaker, due to much slower demand. Newtown apples were slightly weaker, but fairly good demand for them was reported today.
