Leo and Chase Hohenkamp, 20.

CANNER, Princes, Mar. 15. (AP)—Twenty-two American players—the largest number of the Riviera season, are entered in the Cannes club lawn tennis tournament which opened today.

Boulder Helen Wills, the champion, include Miss M. A. Dallett, Mrs. John R. Hall, P. H. Sarnborn and George Hall, all of New York; Miss Isabella Mumford of Boston, Allister McCormick of Chicago and fifteen others who appear in the handicaps.

Miss Wills plays her first singles match tomorrow, meeting Miss L. C. L. Cuppige. Figures issued today show that the lack of competition for Miss Wills at the Nice tournament had a disastrous effect on the receipts which failed to reach 75,000 francs.

**ITALIAN TRIAL INTEREST HIGH**

CHITESE, Italy, Mar. 15. (AP)—The people of this Abruzzi mountain region are awaiting the commencement tomorrow of what is deemed the greatest political "cause celebre" since the trial in France years ago of Captain Alfred Dreyfus for espionage. Five men will be tried for killing Giacomo Matteotti, a Mynaire socialist member of the chamber of deputies.

Matteotti was kidnapped from his residence in Rome on January 10, 1924. His body was found about two months later in a shallow grave 15 miles outside Rome. It had been charged by members of his party that he was killed because of his anti-fascist leanings.

Twenty-five persons were arrested in connection with the killing, but all were released except the five awaiting trial in this town. The public will not be permitted to the court house. All the doors to the building will be guarded. Armed sentinels today watched the sealed doors of the rooms containing Matteotti's bloodstained clothing and the auto in which he was kidnapped.

The authorities have ordered the fascist henchmen be kept out of town. Arriving trains are scrutinized by police and visitors are questioned.

**BAKER TAKES FOURTH PLACE**

Loses to Medford in Consolation Finals—Salem Five Crowned as State Champion.

SALEM, Ore. (By the Associated Press)—In one of the most spectacular and best played basketball games ever seen in the Willamette valley, Salem high school defeated Eugene here Saturday night by a score of 31 to 25 and won the high school basketball championship title of the state. Eugene automatically won second place and Medford high school placed third after defeating Baker 22 to 17.

The mythical all-star high school basketball team was selected here Saturday night by Coleman of O. A. C., head referee of the tournament. The first team is: K. Potts, Medford, right forward; Eberhart, left forward; J. Drager, Salem, center; Coleman, Eugene, right guard; and captain, Drake, Salem, left guard.

The other team chosen by Coleman is: Payne, Baker, right forward; Duffy, Salem, left forward; Lasing, Medford, center; Williams, Medford, right guard; Ottinger, Salem, left guard.

**SPEEDING UP TRACK WORK**

Track work, which started with a gentle working in last Monday, will get down to business at the high school this week. Coach Thorson Bennett announced this morning:

"I'm going to put the boys through the mill now," he declared. "We'll begin the jumps and hurdles this week, and in a few days we'll speed up the distance events—440 and 880—with a little competition. Our principal problem is middle distance and distance material. We should have some pretty good results in a season's work, though, and be able to make a showing by the time of the inter-class meet, which is scheduled for April 4." "Jumps and hurdles, of course, require a long time to develop. The class meet will reveal what we have to count on in that direction." Bright weather has boomed the general enthusiasm for outdoor events. The boys have been clearing off the weeds and smoothing off the track so that it will soon present a first class runway.

**Billy Evans Says:**

The late Charlie Mathewson was a remarkable pitcher. Walter Johnson is easily the most famous of the modern crop of pitchers. Yet the record of Cy Young is dotted with many extraordinary feats of pitching that will probably never be equaled, even by the great Johnson.

Young has over 500 major league victories to his credit. Johnson is the only pitcher with a chance to equal it and he is still about 100 games away.

Young pitched two no-hit games. One in 1904 against the Philadelphia Athletics, the other against the New York Americans in 1908. In the Philadelphia no-hit affair not a player reached first base.

On June 24, 1892, pitching for Cleveland against St. Louis, he held the Browns to a 16-inning 3-3 tie, allowing only five hits. The great Rube Waddell beat him in a memorable 20-inning game on July 4, 1905. The score was 4-2; Waddell was with Philadelphia at the time, Young with the Boston Red Sox.

Rube Waddell was always a jinx for Cy Young. The big southpaw invariably lost him.

**GREAT RECORD.** In the season of 1904, pitching for the Red Sox, he beat 54 Kilt-man, working for Detroit, 1-0, in 15 innings.

During five seasons of his career Young won 80 or more games, his best mark being 16 in 1892, when he was a member of the Cleveland club, then in the National league. In six seasons of his remarkable major league record he won 25 or more games; in four, 20 or more games.

Making 15 years of big league pitching in which he won from 20 to 30 games annually.

Star pitchers are easy to umpire for. There never were three umpires to call balls and strikes for than Cy, Christy and Walter.

**IDEAL TEMPERAMENT**

Well do I recall an incident that came up in an important game at Boston some 15 years back and how Young got out of an embarrassing situation. In those days Detroit and Boston were bitter rivals. With the bases filled and Sam Crawford, the Babe Ruth of those days, up, I erred on a perfect strike that would have retired the side, instead of making the count three and two.

Lou Criger, catching Young, made a strenuous protest. I knew that I had missed it but remained silent while Criger got the venom out of his system. Before he finished Young walked up to the plate and yelled at Criger:

"We can't get the side out with conversation; give me the ball; I think Evans was right, the ball was too low for a strike." That silenced Criger.

**SELDOM KICKED.**

The next pitch was right through the heart of the plate. Crawford hit a terrific drive to deep center that looked good for a home run. Imagine my feeling of satisfaction when the late Chick Stahl made one of the greatest running one-handed catches I have ever seen.

As Cy Young walked past me he smilingly remarked: "Bill, I am not so good I can spot
