YOUR INCOME TAX

A debt discovered to be worthless and charged off the books of the taxpayer for the year 1925 may be deducted from the gross income in computing net income for that year. The return must show evidence of the manner in which the worthlessness of the debt was discovered and that ordinary and legal means for its collection have been or would be unavailing.
If a debt may be deducted in whole or in part, when deducted, the taxpayer must be able to show with a reasonable degree of certainty the amount of uncollectible. Partial deductions are allowed with respect to specific debts only.
A valid debt proved to be worthless may not always be a proper deduction. For example, unpaid amounts representing wages, rents, or similar items are not allowed as deductions unless included as gross income in the creditor's return for the year in which the deduction is sought or in a previous year. The fact that expected income was not received does not reduce the amount of taxable income of the creditor.
Unpaid loans made to needy relatives or friends with little or no expectation that they would be repaid are not deductible, but are regarded as gifts.

Hunter's Role in Arcade Film Merely Human

Glenn Hunter's role in "The Little Giant," the Universal Jewel production which is showing at the La Grande theatre today only, is an unusual one for a motion picture leading man. Instead of being the quintessence of honor, virtue and unflinching self-sacrifice, as is usual in the parts written for the heroes of the screen, the part Hunter plays in this latest Universal comedy-drama, runs the gamut from the lovable to the contemptible and all the way back, for the character is first pictured in childhood, as the "right-hand man" of his foster uncle, an itinerant peddler, who purveys pole beans, taffies, toys and patent medicines from a rickety cart to his hapless, the American housewife.
The youngster takes to peddling like a duck to water and calls forth the admiration of his benefactor when, at this tender age, he exhibits the acquisitive trait that enables the would-be man to sell horse liniment to a garage.
Later in life the youth has been educated at the expense of Uncle Clem until he considers himself far too good for the latter. As the salesman of a specialty organization he falls easily for the cheapest flattery and feels that an all-knowing chap like himself must "hold up his end" and make a great flash before the rum-loving girls who are glad to absorb his flimsy benevolence and acclaim him the little Napoleon of business—until the inevitable fall that comes after pride.

Train Wreck Big Scene in "The Road To Yesterday"

Perhaps the most sensational train wreck in the history of motion pictures is that provided by Cecil B. De Mille in his first personally directed picture production released by Producers Distributing Corporation. A firm believer in the screen doctrine that the end justifies the means, Mr. De Mille caused to be built a duplicate of the K-4 passenger engine, with twelve driving wheels seven feet in diameter and a length overall of eighty feet. As far as is known, no passenger engine such as this has ever been made, especially for use in a photograph, but the result is a magnificent sight, especially when the engine is in motion.
The story of "The Road To Yesterday," at Sherrys, which features Joseph Schildkraut, Jettie Goudin, Vera Reynolds, William Boyd and Julia Payne, is one of unusual dramatic power. The principal characters are travelling in a Pullman coach and at night, suddenly comes a crash, the hiss of escaping steam, dense smoke, shrieks of terror and as this chaotic scene fades away, it is replaced by the peaceful quiet of an old English tavern of the early seventeenth century in "The Road To Yesterday."
Reincarnation is the theme of the story and it has been handled by Mr. De Mille with all the subtle artistry for which he is famous. For the train wreck scene, a special track was built and as setbacks were impossible Mr. De Mille stationed a battery of cameramen strategically so that when the spectacular tragedy occurred, it was filmed from every angle.
