Just where any other director might overreach himself, Cecil B. De Mille, in his first independently produced, personally directed, Producers Distributing Corporation release, "The Road to Yesterday," has excelled himself.

It would seem almost as though this lavish screen production, at Sherrys, was the gratification of this director's boyhood ambition, so perfectly has every minute detail been transferred to the screen.

It has scenes of lavish splendor never before equalled, even by this same De Mille. It has thrilling highlights, a burning at the stake in medieval England, a desperate battle, a high-powered race.

The story starts out in the Grand Canyon of Arizona. The time is the present day. There is a young and not too happy married couple; an engaged couple; a dowager aunt and a handsome young minister.

Through the medium of a train wreck, they are suddenly carried back over the years and find themselves living in the early seventeenth century in medieval England.

In this past life they assume vastly different stations, and their relations toward one another are decidedly varied from their modern existence.

The characters are represented by Joseph Schildkraut, Jotta Gould, Vera Reynolds, William Hoyd, and Julia Faye in featured roles. Comedy showing also.

"Song and Dance Man" Pictures Theater Life as It Is

All the flashing humor, sentiment and pathos that live behind the scenes of Broadway theatrical life are vividly pictured in H. Bronson's production, "The Song and Dance Man," which plays at the Arcade theater, today and Wednesday. Mr. Bronson has taken this original George M. Cohan play, dealing with the pathetic struggles and sacrifices of a typical vaudeville trouper, and transferred it to the screen with a smoothness that bespeaks a thorough familiarity with the starry stage.

He has captured all of the glamour, picturesqueness and color that are part and parcel of backstage life, but he hasn't overlooked the poignant and the hopeful and the tragic side of it. We are treated in the spectacle of a brilliant first-night audience, sitting in a magnificent theater and watching a gorgeous musical comedy. But we are also shown a rudely constructed, ill-smelling honky-tonk, theater, with its rough and ready, liquor-drinking audience, raising a couple of youthful "hoofers."

Our admiration is won by the lavish surroundings of the Broadway stars, and our sympathies are aroused by the cheap, boarding-house atmosphere of the "small-timers." It is this ever-present light and shade, this constant, balancing contrast, that gives the photoplay its realistic flavor and unforgettable appeal.

Mr. Bronson has the able assistance of a competent and experienced personnel. Tom Moore is the song-and-dance man to the very life—a comic, blustering, pathetic vaudevillean—whose whoresouled generosity is his outstanding virtue, and whose consummate conceit, his most damaging fault. Beside him gives a very human, sincere and natural performance as the diminutive actress who wins fame and fortune as a musical comedy star, and His own Ford is the wealthy artist for whom Miss Love eventually gives up her career. Others who deserve honorable mention are Norman Trevor, "Hobby" Watson and Josephine Drake.

In addition to this feature picture and a comedy, R. J. Dykhuus will sing a late song hit "Just a Cottage Small."
