On my way south I had a few hours' layover in St. Louis between trains. To kill the time I jumped into a taxi and rode out to the new ball park that is being constructed for the Cardinals and the Browns.

It will be a ball park worthy of housing a champion when completed. Incidentally, new ball parks have proved miscots for any number of clubs.

It didn't take me long to discover that St. Louis has great hopes for the Browns and Cardinals this year, particularly the National League entrant.

Recognized by a number of the workmen, they immediately suspended operations to discuss the possibility of the two clubs. That was the cue for me to "dunk."

There are going to be a lot of disappointed people in St. Louis unless one of the clubs delivers.

### OPTIMISM HOLDS SWAY

When I jumped into the Cardinals in San Antonio, I found the players just as optimistic as the fans, from Manager Hornsby down to the lowest busher.

The Cardinals figure they have a great chance. Every member on the club is striving for condition, realizing a good start is a tremendous advantage.

This is a feature of play Manager Hornsby is stressing. He wants his team to get away in good style. A game in April, he figures, counts as much as one that is won in September and means much more to the club's morale.

While the Cardinals admit several other clubs in the league look classier on paper, they insist none of them has any license to beat 'em out.

### SATISFIED WITH LINEUP

Here is the way Manager Hornsby sizes up the situation:

"My pitching should be as formidable as that of any of the clubs. I am more than satisfied with our attack. The defense should be improved over that of last year, due to the additional experience a number of the youngsters have gained.

"I believe in the club and the club has come to believe in itself. That, I feel, is the greatest advance we have made toward a high position.

"True, other clubs may look more flashy on paper or when perusing their records, but I am satisfied with my lineup."

Already Managers McKechnie and McGraw of the Pirates and Giants, respectively, have sounded a warning as to the Cardinals, so it looks as if St. Louis might be in for considerable rejoicing before the year is over.

## Quarter Million Trout Planted in West Oregon

PORTLAND, Ore., Mar. 17. (AP)—About 240,000 rainbow and cut throat trout between two and a half and five inches in length were liberated this week in Benton, Linn and Polk county streams, most of which were closed recently by the game commission. The fish were taken from the Roaring River hatchery where the ponds have become crowded. Several hundred thousand fish remain there and will be liberated later. About 200,000 trout of the same size will be set free in Clatsop streams later this week.

T. J. Gregg, who for a number of years has supervised trout distribution, declared the trout the finest he had ever released.

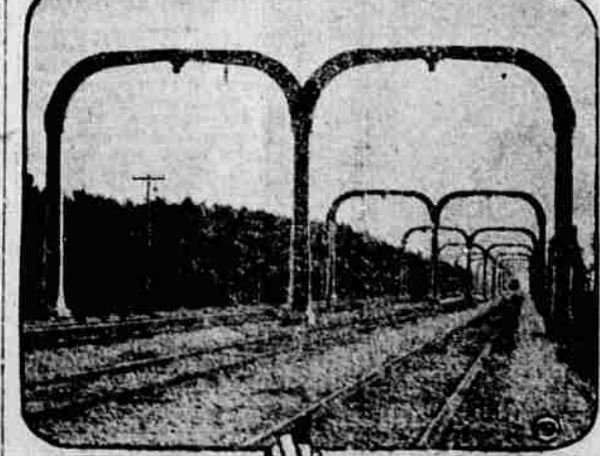
## W. S. C. Grid Coach to Be Orin Hollingberry
