EUGENE MAN IS FREED, ONLY TO BE REARRESTED

EUGENE, Ore., Mar. 17. (AP)—Mark Brown, who figured in a number of arrests on liquor charges during the past year, was freed from a charge of disorderly conduct yesterday when Judge G. P. Skjovorth of the circuit court allowed a motion for a directed verdict in favor of Brown.

Brown had been charged with two other defendants, his brother John Brown and Ted Van Gysen all of whom were freed of the charge. Officers had charged that they participated in a "wild party" at Mark Brown's home.

When Mark Brown walked from the courtroom he was re-arrested by Sheriff Frank E. Taylor, on a charge of possession of liquor on the night of the alleged party. He entered a plea of guilty when arraigned in justice court and his trial was set for March 24.

WEATHER HELPS OFFICERS TAKE ESCAPED COUPLE

EUGENE, Ore., Mar. 17. (AP)—Nature aided Lane county officers in the capture of two escaped prisoners last night. Quentin Garrett, 23, and Carl Starr, 33, leaped from a moving car driven by an officer when the machine was on its way to the county jail. The men dropped into the wilderness off the highway, and John Wasson, the officer, came on in with the third prisoner, Charley Doran, 29, who had chosen to stay with the car.

An hour later officers brought in Starr, manacled, and scoured from contact with hidden wire fences. In another hour they returned with Garrett, subdued and muffled. He was caught in a patch of adobe soil.

The three men were jailed on charges of possession of a gallon jug of whiskey.

Seattle Company Gives Bid on Muscle Shoals

WASHINGTON, Mar. 17. (AP)—The Nitrogen Products company, of Seattle, Wash., has notified the Muscle Shoals joint congressional committee that it expects to submit a bid for the lease of the property. This is the first bidder formally to notify the committee of its intentions. The company requested that its representatives be given a hearing so that details of the contract could be discussed.

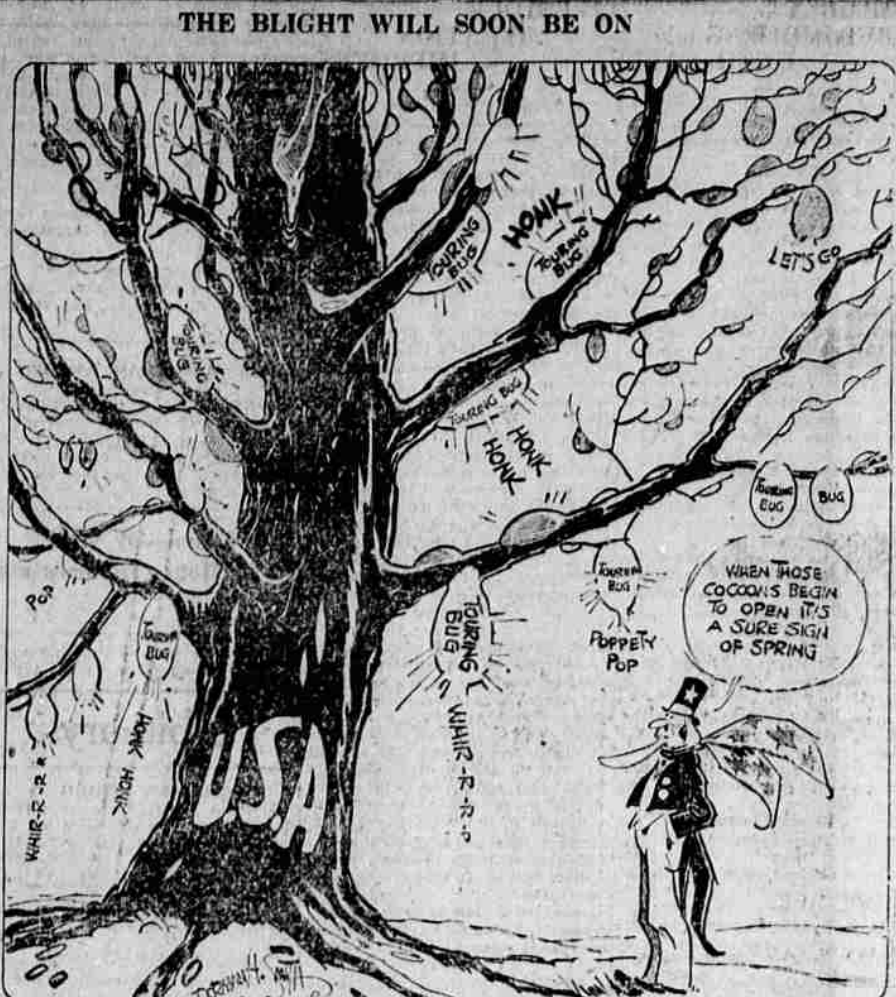

HIRTH SCORED IN COMMITTEE

WASHINGTON, Mar. 17. (AP)—Members of the House agricultural committee charged at a hearing today that offers to "intimidate" congressmen had been made certain farm relief leaders of the middle west.

Representative Tincher, republican, Kansas, and Representative Kinchloe, democrat, Kentucky, referred to William Hirth, chairman of the corn belt committee, who recently returned to his home at Columbus, Mo., after telling the committee that both political parties would ignore agriculture "at their peril."

"Mr. Hirth," said Representative Kinchloe, "tried to make ethics run down our backs."

Representative Rubey, democrat, Missouri, defending Mr. Hirth, said he was sorry "the gentleman from Kentucky had been scared."

"There were no ethics running down my back," retorted Mr. Kinchloe, "but I object to having a cheap skate like that threatening this committee."

Representative Jones, democrat, Texas, said Mr. Hirth's threat and those of some other witnesses "were not veiled, but unveiled."

Representative Tincher added that such methods would "get them nothing."

Representative Rubey contended Mr. Hirth had been within his rights in repudiating both parties of their campaign pledges to the farmer. Mr. Tincher then caused another flurry by declaring he understood the American council of agriculture was "being kept up by liberal contributions for political purposes."

P. W. Murphy, chairman of the council's executive committee, said nothing of this, and added that he had paid his expenses from his home at Wheaton, Minn.

SAN PEDRO, Cal.—The power yacht Westwood, reported whaling so numerous in the San Ignacio harbor on the gulf side of Lower California, that they "endangered the vessel. Thirty-six were in sight at one time, the yacht party reported.

The Garden

NEW DAHLIAS FOR BEDDING

No development in the plant world has been more remarkable than that of the dahlia in recent years. We now have them 12-foot giants with blooms ten inches in diameter to little fellows 15 inches tall for bedding plants. Dahlias, although tuberous rooted perennials, are easily grown as annuals, blooming the first year from seed after which the roots may be kept for years.

The seedlings show a great variety of coloring and from a packet of seed of a fine strain you may gain some prize winners and all will be handsome plants. The named varieties are the cream of thousands of seedlings which have been propagated.

The low-growing bedding types sold under various names such as Mignon, miniature, star and other titles are well worth a trial by every gardener as late flowering annuals, coming along with the first and giving two months of bloom from an early start. These bedding strains give, as a rule, single flowers about three inches across which are magnificent material for cutting.

Dahlias grow as easily as sinners from seed and the seeds look something like a hotbed or indoors and transplanted into their outdoor quarters as soon as the frost season is past. Dahlias like moderately rich soil. It is quite possible to overfeed them and cause them to produce too many leaves but they must have water and cool feet to flourish. They grow in their native haunts in Mexico with their heads in the sun and their feet in the cool depths of surrounding verdure.

Give a dahlia a good supply of water with fair soil and it will flourish. Once it becomes dry and the growth becomes woody it is gone as a bloomer. The proper treatment then is to cut down the woody stalk and new growth will spring up to give bloom. Try

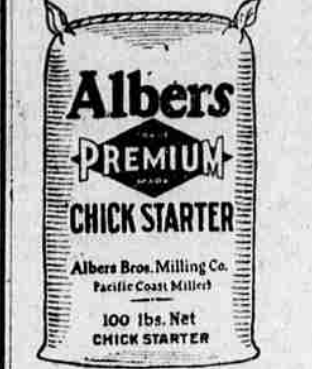
