Victor Schertzinger has added another notable photoplay to his list in "The Golden Strain." This film screen version of one of Peter H. Kyne's best stories, which comes to the Rialto theater for a three days' engagement.

The picture is one of the most spectacular that even Schertzinger ever made. Much of the action takes place in Arizona and the famous Tenth Cavalry adds a striking touch of realism to the scenes where several hundred Apaches attack a government supply train only to be repulsed by Uncle Sam's gallant troopers. There have been Indian battles in other motion pictures, but there is realism in this one that quickens the pulse and makes the spectator tingle.

The foster-brother (Frank McGlynn) pitilessly humiliates him for his weakness and resolves to make a man of him. This is accomplished by a stinging blow in the face which brings out the supposed coward's real manhood. Once aroused, Milt proves to be a real, red-blooded son of his father, and fights his way out of military disgrace to a glorious triumph.

The cast supporting Miss Bellamy and Mr. Harlan includes Ann Pennington, Crawford Davidson, Frank Reel, Robert Fraser, Frank McGlynn, Hobart Bosworth, Grace Morse, Larry Fisher, Lola Meekey and many others of established screen fame.

The comic comedy "Buried Treasure" will also be shown.

George Walsh in "American Pluck" Is Featured at Sherrys

In his latest photoplay "American Pluck" at Sherrys, George Walsh is the very personification of man. Valentino Plays Italian Role in "Cobra"

Although Rudolph Valentino was born under the romantic Italian skies, he plays an Italian for the first time since he became a star in "Cobra," which will be shown at the Arcade theater, beginning Thursday.

He has interpreted nearly every other nationality. In "The Four Horsemen" he was an Argentinian, in "The Sheik" he was an Arab, in "Blood and Sand" he was a Spaniard. "In Monsieur Beaucaire" he was a Frenchman.

In "Cobra" Valentino plays an Italian count with a weakness for the ladies. His appeal to women leads him, against his own will, into an affair with the wife of his best friend. This has a tragic and dramatic climax—one of the strongest situations in which the star has ever appeared.

"Cobra" was adapted from Martin Brown's successful Broadway drama by Anthony Coldeway and directed by Joseph Henabery. It was produced by the star personally under the Ritz-Carlton banner. The title means the lure of a fascinating, unscrupulous woman—the charm which the cobra exerts over its victims.

Nita Naldi, who has reduced her weight to 125 pounds, plays the cobra woman, Gertrude Olmstead, blonde and wholesome, has the sympathetic feminine role. Casson Ferguson returns to the screen as the best friend.

The action starts in Italy, but most of it takes place in New York. It is a modern drama and has been produced on a lavish scale.

Trade Figures Disclose Alaska Good Investment

JUNEAU, Alaska, Mar. 17. (AP)—Trade figures compiled by John C. McBride, collector of customs for the territory, show that Alaska, for which the United States in 1925 paid \$1,200,000, exported \$2,223,735 worth of products in 1925 alone. The territory closed the year with a favorable trade balance of \$1,023,735. The total value of merchandise shipped from and into Alaska in 1925 was \$3,422,245, of which \$2,398,511 was imported and the balance exported.

Gold, silver and copper production materially increased. The fish showed a slight decrease, the total being \$3,163,845 in 1924, and \$2,609,451 in 1925. The shortage was attributed partly to a small salmon run in the Bristol Bay district and to restrictions made by the government for preservation of the industry.
