HANEY OPPOSED TO SHIP BOARD'S PRESENT POLICY

PORTLAND, Ore., Mar. 19. (AP)—Subsidizing the merchant marine would cost a relatively small sum and would be the surest guarantee of national prosperity for the United States, Bert E. Haney, former member of the shipping board, said in an address here last night. Although subsidizing the merchant marine might cost the country fifteen to twenty million annually this would be less than that paid by the government for many less important things, Mr. Haney said. "The very people who are opposed to subsidizing for the merchant marine are for a high protective tariff. How are you going to support one and not the other?" he asked. "The shipping board method is the wrong way to run this thing," he added.

SPORT NEWS

TRACK TRIALS UP NEXT WEEK

Some track trials will be run next week, as soon as the boys are in shape to put on spikes, coach Thomson Bennett announced at the high school this morning.
So far, no middle distance men have shown up. The coach expressed a hope to develop a good miler, some promising material having been noticeable in the distance class. Shot and discus prospects look good in the weight division, Bennett observed.
"I intend to stand by my rule that men who do not go out for track are not good enough to go out for football next fall," the coach declared. "Because there are things in track that help football, and men in high school are not so far along that they haven't room for improvement."
"Track really is a wonderful developer for football. It teaches poise and balance, and enables the athlete to handle his body in better shape."
"Poise is the main thing in football, too, these days," he added. "If a football man can't hold his body absolutely in control, he's going to be caught in many disadvantageous positions."
"We ought to make some creditable records in track this year. But we'll wait for the interclass meet to find most of our material."

TELLS PURPOSE OF FISH RACKS IN THE WALLOWA

ENTERPRISE, Ore. (Special)—Indicating the interest of the United States bureau of fisheries in the Oregon state hatchery at Enterprise, H. B. Holmes of the federal bureau was here yesterday studying conditions at the local institution. He also marked a large number of small yanks which will be turned out in the river, as the scientists hope to learn what will become of these fish when living under changed conditions will look for their return in the Columbia in one or two years.
Enterprise is the one place in the Columbia river system hatching sockeye salmon, or bluebacks. The government has furnished the eggs, which have been taken in Alaska, but this arrangement is considered temporary, and it is expected that the local hatchery will develop its own supply of eggs when the run is established.
This is back of the continued efforts of the state fish commission to take sockeyes from the river, for which purpose the salmon racks have been placed in the Wallowa for a couple of years. First they were located near Troy, where they were too inaccessible for satisfactory results. Then they were installed in the canyon, alongside the highway and sportsmen objected, erroneously assuming they interfered with trout. This year they will be placed a short distance below the hatchery.

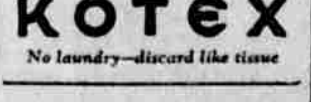
