

FARMERS WILL BUILD CANAL

ENTERPRISE, Ore. (Special).—A group of Wallawa county farmers, organized in the Alder Hope Ditch company, will construct this spring a seven mile irrigation ditch on Alder Hope which will irrigate a large area in that territory, located near here.

The ditch will carry water from both the Wallawa river and Hurricane creek which streams have been filed on by the farmers. It will begin at the river at the lower part of Carl Whitmore's farm, and will carry water from this stream over Hurricane creek in a flume, and then will pick up water from Hurricane creek and carry this into the same ditch farther on.

Sam Litch is president of the ditch company and O. D. Shaver is secretary. The call for bids for the construction work has been issued.

Infant Is Burned to Death Near Eugene

EUGENE, Mar. 19. (AP).—Mabel Irene Lambert, 7 months old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Lambert, residents of Knapstrom Mill, five miles west of Crow, was burned to death Wednesday evening, when the house in which she was sleeping caught fire.

The fire broke out about 5 o'clock according to meagre information here, and the four other Lambert children were outside playing at the time. Mrs. Lambert was leaving on an errand when she noticed that the house was on fire. She rushed back and in an effort to save the baby was herself seriously burned.

The Garden

HOTBED SEASON NOW AT HAND

With the approach of March, the hotbed season is upon us and every gardener with his bit of outdoor glass is preparing to start the nature-formed heat to get the vegetable and flower seeds started for the early crop. It is to be hoped that scientists will soon discover a substitute to ferment and produce the heat for hotbeds as a supply of fresh horse manure, which is the essential heat unit, becomes more difficult each year and the available supply is too often mixed with shavings and is not of the strawy texture needed.

While synthetic manure is now available, thanks to British experimenters who have placed their compound on the American market this year, it has not the heating

qualities necessary to operate a hotbed. It is something to be desired but it is not in sight. The preparation of a hotbed is familiar in every community where there are gardens. The value of it is not thoroughly appreciated until a gardener has one of his own.

By the use of a hotbed he can in most parts of the country get seed going the first week in March in favorable years and usually by March 15 under any circumstances except an unusual cold snap. The hotbed will start lettuce in time to have it head, the main need, as head lettuce must get an early start and do its developing during the cooler days of the year.

Tomatoes, egg plants, onions for big bulbs, peppers, the entire cabbage tribe, lima beans planted eye down, and all the later flowering annuals wanted for the beds can go in. The frame is again useful in the fall for a late crop of head lettuce started in September and for a supply of all winter parsley and for pansies for the greater part of the winter. These can be removed in March to make way for

the manure and heat necessary to start the seeds.

Hotbeds have been made less expensive by the introduction of substitutes for glass, unbreakable and easily handled, consisting of wire

dow screening with celluloid filling, cloth treated in much the same manner, and other compounds. They are best used as double glass. Do not drive a car with the spark too far advanced, particularly in the engine. This practice places a severe strain on the engine, bearings, crankshaft, connecting rods and wrist pins.

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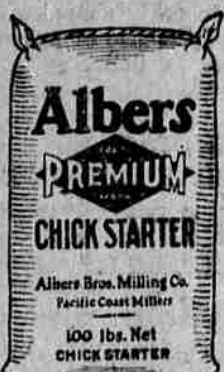
