Sister Mary Says:

(By Sister Mary)

Breakfast—Stewed prunes, cereal, thin cream, fish hash, corn meal muffins, milk, coffee.

Luncheon—Baked lima beans with tomatoes, brown bread and butter, orange cream, plain cookies, milk, tea.

Dinner—Salted steak, baked sweet potatoes, browned parsnips, onion with hard cooked egg dressing, dried apple pudding, graham bread, milk, coffee.

These are simple economical menus worked out to give maximum food value at minimum cost. The dinner dessert is particularly "seasonable" when fresh apples are becoming rather scarce and green apples are not "in."

Dried Apple Pudding

One cup dried apples, 1 cup molasses, 1 1/2 cups flour, 3 tablespoons butter, 2 eggs, 1 teaspoon soda, 1 teaspoon cinnamon, 1/2 teaspoon cloves, 1/2 teaspoon salt.

Wash apples through several waters, let stand over night in cold water to cover. In the morning cut into small pieces and simmer until tender in the water in which they were soaked. Dissolve soda in molasses and add to stewed apples. Mix and sift flour, spices and salt and stir into first mixture. Add butter and beat well. Add eggs well beaten and turn into a well buttered baking dish. Bake forty-five minutes in a moderate oven. Serve warm with hard sauce.

It is now time to get the seed boxes into action for the early vegetables if there is no frame available for the purpose. Make a resolution to start a frame another year as you plant the seed boxes. It is a great convenience, much easier to handle and the first expense is the chief one. The average frame which is six feet by six feet will accommodate all the flower and vegetable seeds the average gardener will need and it will take much less care and attention than the indoor seed box which must be turned daily to keep the seedlings growing straight as they will always incline to the light.

Library Places Branch In Willow School Area

The public library has recently opened a new branch library at Willow school with three hundred volumes for circulation in the Willow district. The bookcases for the library were donated by the parent-teacher association of that school. Miss Gertrude Wagner has charge of the library which will be open each Friday afternoon from two until 4:30 o'clock. Adults in the community are urged to make use of its shelves.

This is the La Grande library's third branch now in operation here. The first one was established more than a year ago at the Grande Ronde hospital and a second one was opened at the Greenwood school the first of the year.
