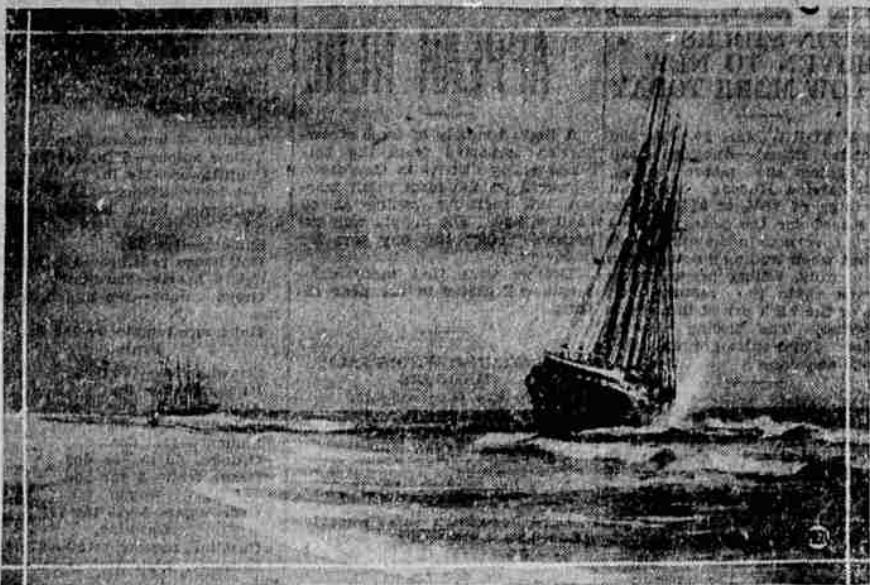

Capt. Johnson of the Robert E. Dean is left drifting at 62 by the loss of his vessel. He and his men blame a black cat that came aboard just before the ship left Miami.
