Francis Snodgrass to Take Trip with Band

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, Ore., Mar. 20. (Special)—Francis Snodgrass of La Grande has been chosen as one of 25 students to take the annual trip with the military band. The musicians will tour the Coast this country this year, giving concerts and dances in Marshfield, North Bend, Coquille, Myrtle Point, Bandon, Redford and Powers.

For the last 21 years the band has regularly toured some part of the state. Some of the events and festivities placed for have been the Lewis and Clark world fair in

1906, the Portland Rose festival in 1907-08-09, the world fair at Seattle in 1909, the strawberry carnival at Roseburg in 1910-11-12, the Panama Pacific exposition at San Francisco in 1915, and a number of state and county fairs. The spring vacation tours throughout the state and adjoining states average 200 miles.

WOOL REPORT.

BOSTON, Mar. 20. (AP)—The Commercial Bulletin says today: "The domestic wool market still is vacillating and in sharp contrast with the steady, strong tone prevailing in the foreign markets. The notable event of the week has been the sale of 200,000 pounds of Missouri quarter-blood combing wool at 41 cents for May-June delivery, a new low basis, which has been the subject of much discussion. Quotations on the local market are exceedingly difficult at the moment. Mohair is quiet but steady. "London on the whole is about five per cent above opening rates. Medium, cross-breeds being the weakest spot. The foreign primary markets are all strong. In the west, there has been little news this week. Shearing is gradually spreading."

"The goods market reports indicate irregular business. Opening of women's wear by auction of the American woolen mills have been made at reductions of 15 to 18 per cent from prices of a year ago. Men's wear worsteds still enjoy most favor. "Secured basis: Oregon—Eastern No. 1 staple \$1.15 to \$1.17; fine and P. M. combing \$1.08 to \$1.10; Eastern clothing \$0.93 to \$1; valley No. 1 \$1. "Mohair—Best combing 75 to 80c; best carding 65 to 70c."

Services of Lent Sound Solemn Note

Spirit of Season Unites with Featured Worship to Attract La Grande Churchgoers.

Lent sounds a note of solemnity through the announcements for worship services that will be conducted in La Grande churches tomorrow.

Two guest speakers, a missionary thank offering, a pre-Easter revival and a motion-pictured account of "The Life and Travels of Jesus" are some of the special inducements for regular and occasional church attendants.

At the Church of God chapel, N. avenue and Spruce street, the Rev. Nelson Knight, lumberjack evangelist of western Washington, is attracting increasing crowds by his ardent preaching of the gospel. His sermons have been marked by a large number of conversions, according to Claude C. Pratt, the pastor.

First Methodist. In accordance with the annual custom of the Women's Foreign Missionary society, the divine service Sunday will be in the nature of a thank offering. The leaders of the society have expressed a hope that the collection this year may reach \$100. It is to be used, together with the thank offerings from branches of this society all over the world, for evangelistic purposes on the foreign missionary fields. Last year the total sum collected at the annual March service was \$2,750,000. "Builders of the Kingdom Highway" will be the subject of Dr. H. W. Parker's sermon. Special music will be provided.

Sunday marks the beginning of the attendance contest that will end in May. A suitable gathering will mark the close of the contest. Carl L. Wallace will be in charge of Sunday school at the regular hour, 9:45.

Epworth League will meet in the church parlors at 6:30 p. m. At 7:30, the evening worship service will be held.

First Presbyterian. The sermon series on "The Character of Jesus" will be concluded by the Rev. William Crosby Jones, pastor, at the morning service. Mrs. A. L. Richardson, director-soprano, Mrs. W. H. Bohnenkamp Jr., G. L. Dutton and Ray Williams will be assisted by Mrs. E. F. Walden in the anthem, "Still, Still With Thee" by Neidlinger. Mrs. J. A. Tedford will be organist. Adeline Clark will sing Dickson's "Thanks Be to God."

Weekly increases in the enrollment in the Sunday school department. Services start at 9:45. Junior Endeavor meets at 4 p. m., and Intermediate Endeavor at 6:15.

Evening service at 7:30 will continue the Lenten talks on "The Life and Travels of Jesus" with film pictures on the screen. Mrs. C. S. Moore will be vocal soloist, with Miss Gladys Miller at the piano organ.

Central Church of Christ. The Men's Bible class will meet in the "old fellow" hall, in the former Y. M. C. A. building. The subject for study will be "The Introduction of Sin Into the World," from the account found in the third chapter of Genesis.

At morning worship, the Rev. C. V. Dunn will speak on "Preparation for Spiritual Service," the message to prepare the way for the evangelistic effort the church is to make during the coming two weeks. There will be special music and a caterpillar feature. At the close of the service, all who have enlisted for personal work are to meet in a short conference.

"What Does Jesus Mean by Cross-Bearing?" will be the topic for the Endeavor meeting at 6:20 p. m.

Dr. W. J. Loaring Clark Gives Opening Address Of Preaching Mission

Dr. W. J. Loaring Clark, of New York, opened a 10-day preaching mission at the St. Peter's Episcopal church, last evening in an address in which he contrasted the boyhood and home life of the Christ with the conditions that surround the youth of today.

The lamentable tendencies in the life of the adolescents of the modern age are due to the lack of religious training in their homes, the missionary said.

"My purpose here is to meet with the bishop and the clergy of the district to see if we cannot get a return to the first principles of Christianity," Dr. Clark explained to the Observer reporter at the close of last night's service.

Must Respect Law. "The first principle is respect for law and order because of reverence for the God of law and order. Then there is the Christian principle of relationship—the relationship we hear about service must be based on the Christian principle of love which is friendship, sympathy and helpfulness, and can only be permanent as we recognize the foundation of love to one another in our love to God. This must be expressed through preaching, teaching and practicing the Christian religion. The emphasis of the sermon must be directed to the awakening of our responsibility to God, and the expression of that relationship is to be found in our relationship to our fellow men."

There will be no service this evening. Sunday morning, the missionary will preach on the subject, "I Am Too Busy." His evening's sermon tomorrow will be on the theme, "The Worst Thing in Life." A question box is kept at the door, and beginning Sunday evening inquiries along religious lines submitted there by members of the congregation will be answered by Dr. Clark after each sermon.

Congregational singing will be featured at all the meetings, the Rev. Oliver Riley, rector, announced.

GOOD FRIDAY TO BE OBSERVED AT UNION SERVICE

Good Friday, when Christian churches universally commemorate the divine agony of the Savior, will be observed in La Grande with a union service from noon till 3 p. m. at St. Peter's Episcopal church. The service is under the auspices of the Ministerial association, members of which formulated plans at their meeting Monday morning.

Addresses suited to the occasion will be given by the Rev. Henry W. Park of the First M. E. church; the Rev. G. A. Pollard, of the First Baptist church; the Rev. W. C. Ross, of the Presbyterian church, and the Rev. Oliver Riley, rector of St. Peter's.

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Monks Use Torture At Easter Time

Ancient Order of Penitents Still Enacts Crucifixion to Prove Its Sincerity.

SANTA FE, N. M., Mar. 20. (AP)—While the Christian world is making ready for the observance of Easter, in few places are the preparations as unique and wrapped in mystery as in the almost inaccessible mountain villages of New Mexico.

Here hundreds of persons, descendants of the Spanish conquistadors and members of the Society of Penitent Brothers, are planning their annual rites. The ceremonies reach their climax with the enactment in a crude way of the crucifixion of Christ at sunset on Good Friday. The natural setting has been described as closely resembling the actual scene of the Holy Land.

The society and the rites are centuries old. The organization had its foundation among the monasteries of Spain and France before the discovery of America, and was transplanted to the new world by the first religious brothers who penetrated the southwest region of the United States in the sixteenth century.

Because of the inaccessibility of the regions where the brotherhood still has its strongholds in New Mexico, their customs and services have changed but little.

The Easter services start the night of Wednesday preceding Easter, which include fasting and the initiation of new members. On Wednesday evening, after dusk, the penitents, as they are called, leave their moradas, or lodge buildings, and in a procession, proceed into the hills, where their flickering lanterns may be seen dodging in and out among the trees and bushes.

This procession is repeated Thursday night, increasing in its enthusiasm. The penitents as they march barefooted over the sharp stones and cactus of the hills, whip themselves and each other with long lashes, often until blood streams down their backs, so that their trails may be traced by stains upon the ground.

The entire day of Friday is given over to pilgrimages from one morada to another. As Friday night approaches, the flagellants wax to a fever heat of excitement. The crucifixion itself is a dramatic climax. An effigy is bound or nailed to a long cross, which is erected amid ceremonies which only a few persons of the outside world had witnessed until the last few years.
