PEOPLES ARMY IS RETREATING

TIEN TSIN, Mar. 22 (AP).—This city of 750,000 inhabitants was completely evacuated by the Kuomintang or national army troops in their retreat toward Peking, 35 miles, before the victorious troops of Chang Tso-Lin, the Manchurian dictator, and those of his allies from the province of Shantung.

The city was thrown into a brief panic by sudden appearance of hundreds of armed men wearing uniforms of General Li Ching-Ling, former civil governor of Chahai province. They had accented themselves in the Japanese and French settlements and had rushed into the native city in automobiles when the last detachment of the Kuomintang troops was marching toward Peking.

A few Kuomintang stragglers were shot by Li Ching-Ling soldiers, who also frequently fired Mauser rifles into the air. Presently the firing ceased.

There were numerous casualties in the city owing to the reckless firing by Li Ching-Ling troops, but there was little looting. It is reported, however, that the villages along the line of march from Manchung were looted by the retreating soldiers of the third Kuomintang troops.

PEKING, Mar. 22 (AP).—The members of the cabinet which resigned on Saturday, are retaining their posts temporarily at the request of the chief executive, but it is assumed there will be a resignation shortly.

The evacuation of Tien Tsin and general retirement of Kuomintang (national army) forces are reported at their headquarters here. Whether an effort will be made to hold Peking appears to be undecided.

The Tien Tsin-Peking rail, occupied by the retreating troops, many of whom continue to move around Peking to the Kalgan railway on their way north. Others are quartered at Tungehow, east of the capital and Nanyuan, to the south.

SALEM, Ore., Mar. 22 (AP).—Walter Higgins, held in jail here, charged with conspiracy in a bank holdup at Troutdale on December 18, and in a robbery of a general store at Monitor on December 1, has confessed to Sheriff O. D. Bowers, District Attorney John H. Carson and Deputy Sheriff Sam Burkhardt to his implication in both robberies, according to the officers, and a statement is being prepared for his signature. It is probable that as soon as the statement is signed Higgins will be turned over to officers of Multnomah county to be tried for the Troutdale affair. Deputy Sheriff H. Christensen of Multnomah county has been working with local officers on the case. Higgins was brought here from Oregon City several days ago.

WASHINGTON, Mar. 22 (AP).—Exports of grain from the U. S. during the week ending March 20 totaled 1,122,000 bushels as against 715,000 the week before. Figures issued today by the commerce department save detailed comparisons for the two weeks. The recovery was stimulated by the widespread belief that a technical rally after the sustained decline of last week and the decision of the United States supreme court to grant a review of the Doherty Oil lease case.
