Sister Mary Says:

(By Sister Mary) Breakfast — Tangarine, bacon in cream gravy on toast, bran and raisin muffins, milk, coffee. Luncheon — Toasted vegetable sandwiches, baked rhubarb, plain cake, milk, tea.

Dinner — Stuffed calf's heart, steamed rice, carrots, turnips, stuffed celery, maple custard pudding, whole wheat bread, milk, coffee.

Since children under ten years of age should not be allowed to eat the dinner meat a nourishing dessert is planned, making the usual protein dish of meat unnecessary for them.

Left-over vegetables are reheated in a cream sauce to which cheese is added. The creamed vegetable is served between crisp triangles of hot toast and a "toasted vegetable sandwich" is the result.

This stuffed calf's heart is a savory dish that is worth trying during the spring months.

Stuffed Calf's Heart One calf's heart, 1/2 pound lean veal, 2 slices bacon, 4 tablespoons state bread crumbs, 1 tablespoon minced parsley, 1 teaspoon minced onion, 2 eggs, salt and pepper.

Wash heart through several waters and remove veins and arteries. Let stand in cold water to more than cover for two hours. Drain and dry. Put veal and bacon through fine knife food chopper several times. Mix with bread crumbs, parsley, onion, salt and pepper. Very little salt will be needed since the bacon is salty. Add eggs and mix thoroughly. Fill heart with this forcemeat and sew. Sprinkle heart with salt and pepper, roll in flour and brown quickly on all sides in a hot frying pan. Put into a deep casserole, add boiling water to half cover, cover casserole closely and cook two and one-half hours in a slow oven. Add more water if necessary. Make a gravy with the liquor in the casserole and pour over heart on a deep platter.

To serve slice down through the heart cross-wise like a jelly roll.

HOME-MAKERS REPORT GIVEN

Editor's Note— This is the first report of the third annual economic conference held here earlier in the month.

The following report of the home-makers conference was submitted to The Observer by Mrs. S. E. Miller, of Union, chairman of this group.

"The home-making division of the conference was a success from the highest standpoint, considering the program. The best authorities on every subject available, who were also forcible and able speakers, were secured for this department.

"Dr. W. T. Phy gave two discussions on health. They were equal to his merit as a learned and experienced physician, and contained valuable instruction for the health of women and children especially.

"Dr. R. P. Landis gave a splendid discussion on sanitation of schools. It was a talk vibrant with big hopes and expectations for the future of the schools. He understands school situations at the present time, and has his heart in the work both as a member of the school board and a physician.

"The talk given by Miss Alice Marquardt on child welfare was excellent, and she gave the problems from the side of actual experience acquired by long work in this line. It was a credit to her and left us all feeling what a splendid asset she is to our country.

"Miss Maude Wilson, of the home economics department of the Oregon experiment station, gave two valuable discussions on spending the dollar wisely, and modern industrial methods applied to the household. She was thorough in her work, for which she has been especially educated, and delivered her talk in a charming manner, making each point clear by diagrams and illustrations.

"Miss Lucy Case, of Oregon Agricultural college extension service, was an artist in her line as well as a teacher. She discussed the following two subjects, which involve all the problems of food: faith, hope, and charity in foods, and diet and the sexes. Each member there was measured and weighed to determine their respective weights and remedies given for same. Samples of foods were arranged in display for the various diets. Miss Case was a charming person and handles her subjects with great skill.

"The home-making program was a splendid success, though like most good things that are new, not as well attended as it should be. But certain to grow, and we are looking forward to a bigger interest shown in this department of the conference next year. If people realized the real good derived from these discussions and their true value, no present building would be large enough to hold the economic conference in the future."
