FUNERAL SERVICES—Funeral services for Roy Evans, of Mt. Glen, who was killed Tuesday afternoon under an overturned tractor while working in a field at the foot of Mt. Emily, will be held tomorrow afternoon at two o'clock at the Bohlenkamp chapel. Interment will be in the Island City cemetery.

ROY RICE—The body of Roy Rice, 32-year-old, who died in Prescott, Arizona, yesterday, will probably be brought to La Grande for burial. Mr. Rice made La Grande his home for many years and graduated from the local high school. He was a member of what is popularly known as the La Grande hospital unit, the first men to enlist in the world war from La Grande.

While in the service Mr. Rice contracted tuberculosis and since his discharge has been in the government hospital at Prescott, Arizona. His death was caused by influenza.

His father-in-law, John L. Norvell, of Helix, passed through La Grande this morning on his way to Arizona to bring the body to Eastern Oregon. Funeral arrangements will be made later.

Known relatives that survive him are his wife, his father, who lives at Helix, and a sister, at Helix. His mother died several years ago here.

He is a member of the Masonic lodge here.

DENVER, Col., Mar. 25, (AP).—A storm, driven before a heavy wind, which blasted the Rocky mountain region yesterday and last night from the Canadian border, where snow fell to New Mexico, where rain was reported, was abating today. The crest of the storm in southern Wyoming last night delayed the eastbound air mail two hours and a half, although the westbound planes were flying on schedule today despite blizzards of snow.

Few extreme drops in temperature were recorded. Leadville, Col., setting the record in Colorado with 8 above zero. Northern Montana had 11 above, while Canadian border points reported four and six above.
