### STRIBLING IS BOUT WINNER

#### Flaming Youth of Georgia Outpoints Buffalo's Pride and Joy Last Night.

NEW YORK, Mar. 26. (AP)—Young Stribling of Georgia continues on the direct to honors in heavyweight boxing while Jimmy Slattery of Buffalo again has learned from the main thoroughfare.

Stribling, just up from the fiasco of Miami, where his match with Gene Tunney was cancelled for lack of financial guarantee, last night in Madison Square Garden outpunched and outlasted in ten rounds the man who two years ago defeated him in a six-round contest. Weight gained the verdict in the final analysis with the Georgian ten pounds heavier than Slattery.

#### Tunney Bout Next.

Today Tunney again looms before Stribling and Billy Gibson, manager of the American light heavyweight champion, says that the match can be made by a promoter of standing at any time. "Indoor or out suits me," said Gibson. "And I am not demanding \$50,000 for Tunney's appearance as reported." The battle may be staged for May 11 at the Garden or may await the opening of the baseball parks. It is more than probable that Tex Rickard will be

behind it this time. Bell Saved Slattery. For more than half of the distance last night neither man appeared to have any appreciable advantage but in the seventh the Georgian loosed an overhead right that caused damage. Slattery to the head had Slattery resting and in the midst of many only the bell saved him from a knockout. He came back, however, to outbox his adversary in the ninth and was fighting with both hands when the bout ended.

Most critics gave six rounds to Stribling and three to Slattery with one even.

Stribling was awarded the decision by the referee's vote after one judge had voted for Slattery. At least the head of the verdict for his wife, the former Virginia Kinney of Macon, Georgia and "Ma" Stribling were at the ringside, while "Pa" was in his corner.

Can Washington win its third successive American League pennant? Manager Stanley Harris believes it can and will. And I might mention that Mr. Harris is not inclined to boasting.

There are many who believe the Senators have passed the peak of their game and are due to crumple, as did the New York Yankees of 1914 after winning three straight.

"I see where some of the boys in the lot will need plenty of glue to keep your team from falling apart this summer," was my greeting to Manager Harris.

"You would think most of my players used crutches, the way some of the experts pick them to pieces," laughingly replied the boy.

"I read the other day where Walter Johnson had only one good leg; how Pittsburgh's arm would doubt as to whether my hand had recovered from last year's injury, and so on down the list of casualties.

"True, a few of my pitchers are a bit aged but more the less valuable because of the experience thus gained.

### MUST BEAT GRIFFS.

"You can say for me that the club that beats Washington is going to come pretty close to winning the American League pennant. That isn't in the nature of a boast but a frank expression of opinion as to our prospects.

"I feel that I have a better ball club than last season. Southpaw Tom Zachary could only win 12 ball games for us. In his place I have Joe Bush, who should win at least a half dozen more.

"I had to lose a promising youngster in Hallon but had to go gamble in order to get Bush. Hallon is a good prospect, while Bush a good pitcher. Realizing I must have better pitching to keep on top this year, I so gambled.

## AMERICA WINS STEEPLECHASE

AINTREE, Lancashire, England, Mar. 26. (AP)—Jack Horner, by Collins out of Melton's guide, owned by C. Schwartz, an American, won the Grand National Steeplechase here today.

Jack Horner won by three lengths, and a length separated the second and third horses. The betting odds against Jack Horner were 25 to 1, against Old Tay Bridge 8 to 1 and against Bright's Boy 25 to 1.

Old Tay Bridge, owned by Mrs. W. H. Dixon, was second, and Bright's Boy owned by the American, Stephen Sanford, third. Thirty horses ran.

Crowds from all parts of the country were in Aintree today to witness the running of the most thrilling and most hazardous of all British racing events—the grand national steeplechase. Late comers, after vainly trying to obtain rooms at hotels or boarding houses hired tents for the night and slept in them. Food to supply 250,000 persons had been carted into Aintree.

The Duke of York, Prince Henry, Prince Chibhibu, second son of the emperor of Japan, and the son of Begum Bhopal headed the list of notables who came to Aintree. All the big country estates were filled with guests.

Americans hoped for a victory by one of the American-owned horses, Stephen Sanford's Mount Etina and Bright's Boy, or C. Schwartz's Jack Horner, for which a high price was paid by English breeders.
