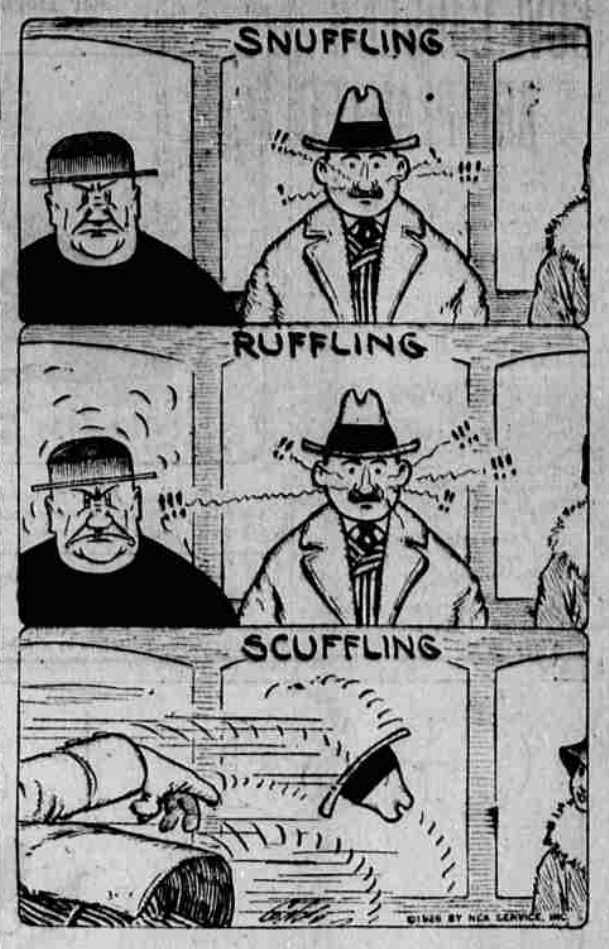

"When Door Opened" From Curwood Novel Is Smashing Drama

There are probably more genuinely dramatic moments in "When the Door Opened," a new Fox Films production, which had its premiere showing in La Grande at the Star theater last night, than in any screen drama this season.

This perhaps is due to the fact that the picture was adapted from one of James Oliver Curwood's greatest novels and another reason is no doubt that the film was directed by Reginald Barker, acknowledged a master of big outdoor film productions. It was fortunate that such a capable director was chosen because the story is worthy of the most skillful handling and Mr. Barker seems to have caught the spirit of the author most admirably.

"When the Door Opened" is melodrama, but it is not melodrama of the ordinary, hackneyed sort. The tense situations do not give the impression of having been driven in with a mallet as he is sometimes the case where the director is striving for smashing effects.

The story has to do with a trusting husband who returns to his home after a long absence, eagerly anticipating a welcome from his beautiful wife. As he enters the house, he hears the voice of a strange man and, upon recovering from his amazement, he shoots the usurper and flees blindly. Next we find him, a homeless wanderer, seeking forgetfulness in the Canadian wilderness. He saves the life of a beautiful girl in a thrilling runaway, is severely injured, and—much against his will, for he has taken to her home, a huge chateau

"Phantom of Opera" Featuring Lon Chaney Coming to Arcade

"The Phantom" was produced on the biggest scale since the Hugo story at Universal. In the cast are Lon Chaney, Mary Philbin, Norman Kerry, Virginia Pearson, Arden Blythe and Dorothy Hutton. Gilson Goodland, John Edwards, Anton Yaverka, John Salpelle, and other noted players. In the scenes in the opera several thousand extras appear.

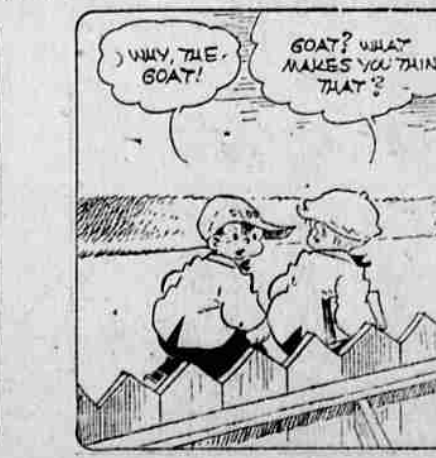
