SIEGRIST TO ERECT HOME

La Grande, for years known as a city of beautiful homes, is to have another important addition to its residential district. Adolph Siegrist today secured a permit from the city recorder to erect an \$8,000 residence building on Washington avenue between Walnut and Oak streets. The home will be one and a half stories high.

During the past week several large permits were taken out, including one by W. A. Hutchinson to erect a garage building on Adams avenue between Second and Third streets to cost \$5,000.

INSULATING ATTIC INSURES COMFORT THROUGH SUMMER

Home-owners often overlook two things about insulation. They may insulate their homes to induce their winter fuel bills without realizing that they also get another benefit—greater comfort in summer.

For insulating materials prevent the passage of heat through walls, roofs, ceilings, and other parts of the home. They prevent it from passing out of warm rooms in winter, and from entering cool rooms in the torrid days of summer. So insulation is a hot-weather proposition, too.

Secondly, many owners think that a home can be insulated only when it is first built. They do not realize that a simple remodeling job will lay a cooling blanket over rooms that tend to get warm in summer.

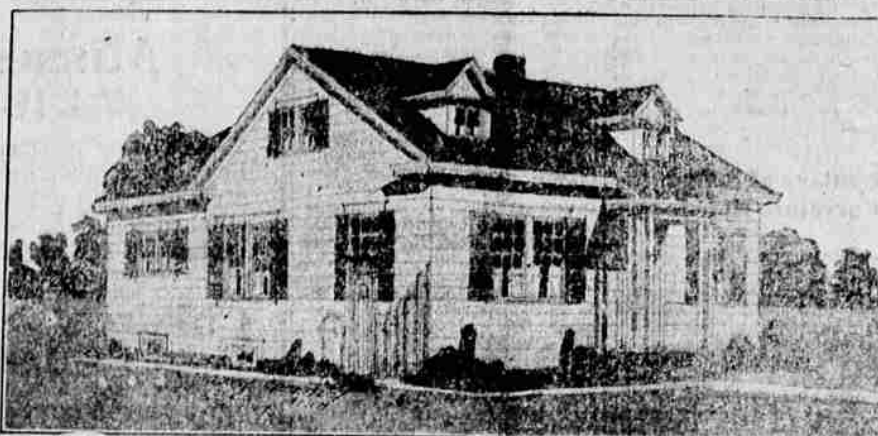
This applies especially to the bungalow or small two-story house with unfinished attic. The whole roof is exposed to the sun; so the attic becomes "as hot as an oven" and this heats the living quarters below.

One way to improve this condition is to finish the attic. If it is large enough, to provide extra rooms. If this is done an insulating quilt or fibrous substance can be nailed to the rafters before lath and plaster are put on. Or insulating rock lath may be used in place of wood as a base for plaster, or an insulating mineral woolboard can be used to provide walls and ceilings for the attic-room.

A Six-Room Colonial Cottage

There is perhaps no other type of home that compels the attention of the passer-by as that of the Colonial. With its bright red brick for soldier course, and steep, white siding painted white, green shingled roof and shutters, this home is exceedingly attractive.

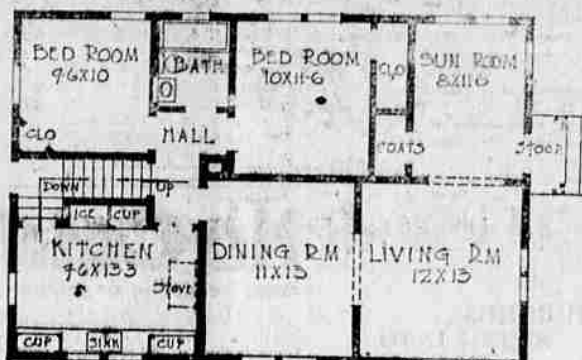
The entrance is direct into a rather small sun room, off which is a large coat closet. Plaster arches are used between this room and the living room, as well as between living and dining room.

From the dining room, one enters a small rear hall, off which are doors leading to two full-sized bedrooms and bath. It will be noted that it is unnecessary to go into the dining room from the kitchen to get to this hall, as in most plans. This arrangement gives a double door between kitchen and dining room.

The main gable of the roof, is from side to side, with another gable in the rear; this permits good head room over the stairs to the attic, while the stairs to basement are underneath, the grade door serving as a rear entrance door.

There is a full basement with the usual heating plant, storage rooms, laundry, fuel, etc. The one chimney, located in the center of the home, permits a very satisfactory installation for a warm air heating plant.

Using oak floors, and trim in the main rooms, pine to paint in the balance, it is estimated that this home can be built as described, exclusive of heating and plumbing, for from \$4500 to \$5000.

Dirigible, to Visit Top Of World, Named 'Norge'

Rome, Mar. 29. (AP)—The dirigible to be used by Captain Roald Amundsen in his polar flight was formally christened the "Norge" today and turned over to M. Thomson, president of the Norwegian Aero club.

The ceremony was held at the Ciampino in the presence of Premier Mussolini, Under Secretary of Aviation Bonanni, the Norwegian minister, Jirgens, the dirigible designer Col. Nettle, and the American and British military attaches.

OREGON LEGION RANKS EIGHTH IN THE NATION

PORTLAND, Ore., Mar. 28.—Oregon department of the American Legion with a quota of 9,981 members is forming ahead in a nation-wide campaign to make 1926 the greatest membership year in the history of the organization nationally, according to a bulletin received here today from national headquarters.

This department had attained 62.50 per cent of its quota according to membership returns on the books of the national treasurer on March 15. In accordance with the national membership program, the department quotas for 1926 were set considerably in excess of their 1925 total membership figures.

Florida was the first department to surpass its quota, going "over the top" in quota on March 11. The ten leading departments in percentage of quota raised by Mar. 15 were: Florida, 100.86; Wyoming, 98.21; Idaho, 86.67; Oklahoma, 79.99; West Virginia, 93.43; Kansas, 65.73; Minnesota, 64.26; Oregon, 64.80; Maine, 61.34; Arizona, 60.21.

FINDS OLD RUBENS

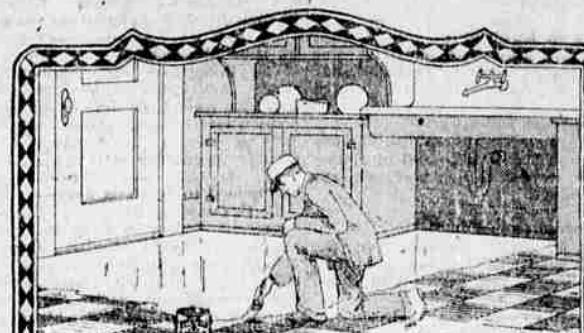
SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Michael J.
