COURT DECLARES SHERIFFS MUST SERVE WARRANTS

SALEM, Ore., Mar. 30. (AP).—The supreme court today, in an opinion written by Justice Brown, overruled a demurrer by Sheriff Harley J. Shuster of Clatsop county in the case of the state tax commission against Shuster, an original mandamus proceeding to compel Shuster to execute warrants for the collection of delinquent state income taxes.

The case is of importance to all counties in the state. Shuster refused to serve warrants sent him by the tax commission, his plea being that he wished to protect himself under his bond and would not serve the warrants without an order from the court. Therefore he demurred to the commission's mandamus petition. Presumably the opinion today will conclude the case and the sheriff will proceed to execute the warrants.

STOCK RALLY OF NO AVAIL

NEW YORK, Mar. 30. (By the Associated Press).—A furious selling attack launched against the leading railroad shares today wiped out the effects of an early rally in the stock market and sent scores of issues to six to eight points below new levels for the year. Losses in some of the less active stocks reached as much as 15 points.

NEW YORK, Mar. 30. (AP).—Stock prices, after a short-lived rally today gave way before another onslaught of selling which was directed with terrific intensity against the leading railroad shares. Scores of new low levels for the year were established on declines of 1 to 8 points with losses of 10 and 15 points registered by some of the inactive issues. Reports that powerful banking interests had rushed their support to the market were circulated following the early rise in United States Steel, General Electric, Dupont and other market leaders but under the cover of this move, liquidation gradually began to place heavy in the railroad groups, resulting in a wide open break as the calling of bank loans was resumed on a large scale.

The closing was weak. The deluge of selling orders poured with unrelenting fury upon the market throughout the late dealings. U. S. Steel was carried below 110 to the lowest price of the year and scores of other industrials and rails were battered 2 to 10 points to 1926 minimum figures. Atlantic Coast Line extended its break to nine points and Jersey Central to 10 points. Total sales approximately 2,000,000 shares.

Use Subpoena to Get Confidential Reports

WASHINGTON, Mar. 30. (AP).—A subpoena was resorted to today by the senate tariff investigation committee in its effort to secure confidential reports from the tariff commission. The subpoena was issued after Chairman Marvin had declined to disclose the vote on the commission's proposed oil inquiry on the ground that it was a confidential report to the president.

The secretary was directed to deliver to the senate committee all of the commission's reports not heretofore made public, and the copy of a letter Chairman Marvin wrote President Coolidge asking permission to publish the sugar report.

Investigating Death of Marshfield Merchant

MARSHFIELD, Ind., Mar. 29. (AP).—An investigation into the death of Price G. Westheffer, also known under the name Westover, local merchant who died suddenly a few weeks ago, has been under way here for the past three weeks, officers have announced. They were awaiting a report on an examination of the vital organs of the body which was ordered at post mortem two days after Westheffer's death late in February.

Ten Killed, 20 Injured In Bogota Rail Wreck

BOGOTA, Colombia, Mar. 29. (AP).—Ten persons are known to have been killed and 20 injured in the collision last night of an express train bound from Bogota for Girardot and the coast and a freight train. Two first class coaches were thrown into a river.

The express train carrying passengers and mails for abroad, dashed at full speed into the rear end of the freight train, which was standing at Corso station.

House Takes Up Case Against Judge English

WASHINGTON, Mar. 30. (AP).—The house today took up the formal charges of impeachment that its judiciary committee has brought against Federal Judge George W. English, of Illinois.

An unusually large percentage of the membership was present when Chairman Graham of the committee, called up the articles of impeachment.

After a clerk had read the five articles, the house decided to proceed for the rest of today without limit on the time allotted for debate.

Asked by Representative Crisp, democrat, Georgia, whether the house would have an opportunity to vote separately on each article of impeachment, Speaker Longworth replied that this was his understanding.

SAN FRANCISCO, Mar. 30. (AP).—U. S. Bureau Agricultural Economics.—Fairly good demand was reported for live poultry today. Small Leghorn broilers were weaker due to very liberal supplies. RAIL COMPANY HAS DEFICIT
SALEM, Ore., Mar. 30. (AP).—The Oregon Electric Railway company incurred a deficit in its operations during 1925, according to the annual report filed with the public service commission. Operating revenue for the year was \$1,077,990.24, a decrease of \$28,265.84 as compared with the previous year. Operating expenses were \$1,181,368.24, resulting in a deficit of \$103,378, which was a heavier deficit by \$23,488.81 than for the previous year. The company's 1925 tax payments were \$70,735.66, an increase of \$14,982.52.

WHEAT ADVANCES BEFORE MARKET CLOSING TODAY

CHICAGO, Mar. 30. (By the Associated Press).—Notwithstanding a temporary setback about midday resulting from pronounced weakness in the New York stock market wheat today advanced sharply in the late dealings. Buying of the Chicago May delivery of wheat disclosed a dearth of offerings and previous speculative sellers made haste to even up their accounts. Predictions were current of a tight situation developing as the end of the old crop season comes nearer.

Wheat closed firm 1/4 to 1/2c net higher; corn 1/4 to 1c up and oats at 1/2c 1/2 to 1c gain.

Values Steady Despite The Heavy Production

PORTLAND, Mar. 30. (AP).—Values in the local dairy list are holding fairly steady in the face of heavy production, but jobbers along the street still look for lower prices in butter and eggs.

Today fresh standard extras are a cent higher in the egg market, being posted at 26 cents net on the exchange. Receipts of fresh eggs yesterday totaled 875 cases.

Butter receipts of country cubes yesterday amounted to 211,265 pounds with 16,152 pounds manufactured by local creameries. Storage stocks are given at 4536 pounds.

On the dairy exchange extra cubes eased off a half cent, closing at 38 1/2 cents. Standards and lower grades held steady.

Country dressed meats are generally steady at prevailing prices. Receipts are not large but the demand is limited to fancy cuts.

Best calves bringing 18 to 18 1/2 cents with ordinary stock selling at 17 to 18 cents.

Poultry demand principally for heavy hens and heavy broilers. The latter must be well conditioned and weighing at least 1 1/2 pounds before the trade will take them. Small immature broilers are a drug on the market.
