UNION, Ore. (Special)—A mem-
ber of the child welfare com-
mission of the state accompanied
by the county health nurse, was in
Union Monday and gave talks to
the high school and grade pupils.
The funeral services of Paul J.
Eberlin, who died suddenly Mar.
21 of heart trouble, were held from
the Cook Brothers funeral parlors
Thursday afternoon. The services
were in charge of the Episcopal
minister. The body was laid to
rest in the local cemetery, Mrs.
Eberlin and her children may go
back east to some of her relatives
after straightening up their busi-
ness affairs here.

Vacancies to Fill

vacancies are in the South grade
school. In the high school faculty
there will be one or two changes.
Miss Dorothy Cushman, who has
had charge of the English work
for the past two years, is not re-
turning, and Mr. Emmett, of the
agricultural department, is unde-
cided as to just what he will do
next year. All the other teachers
will be here for next year's work.

Indian Mother Steals Child From Officials

PENDLETON, Mar. 31. (AP).—
Although she was supposed to
have taken poor care of a six-
month-old child, Stella Williams,
an Indian mother on the Unifolia
reservation, loved the child enough
to steal it from officials and se-
crete herself in a drygoods box in
this city when they attempted to
take it from her to a place in
Portland. The child was taken
from her at the reservation fol-
lowing recent complaints. She
followed the officers to Pendleton
and when unobserved, snatched
the child and fled. A search party
found her in the box later.

Increased Selling Pressure on Wheat

CHICAGO, Mar. 31. (By the As-
sociated Press).—Although in-
creased selling pressure that ap-
peared to come from eastern sources led
to some of a late setback in
wheat today, the market quickly
recovered, helped by the fact that
Liverpool prices are at a full ship-
ping difference compared with
Chicago. The transient increased
selling of wheat here coincided
with fresh weakness of New York
securities. Profit taking by Chi-
cago holders of wheat was also a
temporary bearish factor.
Wheat closed unusually nervous
and at not more than 1 1/2 to 2 1/2c
higher in the last few minutes. Corn
finished 1/4 to 1/2c higher and oats
at 1/2 to 3/4c gain.

CHICAGO, Mar. 31. (By the As-
sociated Press).—The wheat open-
ing, 1/2 to 3/4c higher, May, new
\$1.49 to \$1.50 1/2 and July \$1.37 1/2
to \$1.38 1/2, was followed by addi-
tional gains and then by a general
slump.

Chamber of Deputies Adopt Poll Tax Bill

PARIS, Mar. 31. (AP).—The
chamber of deputies adopted the
poll tax provision of Finance Min-
ister Poincaré's bill for the financ-
ing of the budget this morning by a
show of hands after it had been
amended to exempt a great many
taxpayers and reduce the rates for
many others.
M. Poincaré declared the govern-
ment opposed amendments reduc-
ing the tax yield. The chamber,
however, was free to vote as it
pleased, with the understanding
that, if it had not at the end
been provided with all the re-
sources it demanded the govern-
ment would resign.

of undetermined origin early to-
day, delaying trains into Coos Bay.
Only the train with its crew until
the bridge has been repaired,
which is expected in about four
days.

causing no great apprehension.

CONFIDENCE IN STOCK EXCHANGE PARTLY RESTORED

NEW YORK, Mar. 31. (By the
Associated Press).—Speculative
confidence in the stock market was
partially restored today when the
main body of stocks maintained an
upward tendency in the face of re-
newed selling attacks against the
railroad equipment shares and a
few specialties. Prices of popular
issues bounded up one to six points
in a wild outburst of buying at the
opening, sagged one to three points
from their high levels on profit-
taking by traders who had bought
stocks "for a turn," and related
liquidation of weakened marginal
accounts, and then headed upward
to around the morning highs in
the early afternoon on widely cir-
culated commission house advices
that the decline had been checked
at least temporarily.
The closing was steady. Strong
buying support for high-priced
stocks gave the entire list a steadier
tone in the final dealings. Total
sales 2,400,000 shares.

Pacific Phone Company Increases Investment

SALEM, Ore., Mar. 31. (AP).—
The Pacific Telephone and Tele-
graph company increased its in-
vestment in Oregon by \$2,458,8-
184.91, during 1925, according to
the annual report filed with the
public service commission. The
company's total fixed capital in
Oregon \$24,355,059.17. The com-
pany's return on its investment
during the year was 5.8 per cent.
The net income was \$1,415,914.06,
which was \$4,755.73 less than the
previous year.
The total operating revenue for
the year was \$6,833,404.21, an in-
crease over the previous year of
\$11,442.19. The operating ex-
pense was \$4,524,222.97, an in-
crease of \$344,571.66. Total re-
venue deductions in calculating the
net revenue were \$5,418,390.15, an
increase of \$566,195.83.

Storage Operations Active in Egg Market

PORTLAND, Ore., Mar. 31. (AP).—
Storage operations continue ac-
tive in the local egg market al-
though operators have steadfastly
maintained they would not store
unless price levels ranged consid-
erably lower, and yet the eggs con-
tinue to find their way into the
coolers. Conditions, for the con-
sidered unfavorable, for heavy stor-
age in the warm days and chilly
nights during March and the first
part of April, reflect in the qual-
ity, when stocks are candled out of
storage. Ideal weather, when there
is little danger of night chill,
comes later in April and May, but
before the arrival of the real hot
temperatures.

Portland storage holdings have
now climbed to 10,585 cases, with
the entire holdings in coast cool-
ers reported at 150,467 cases as
compared to 145,877 cases a year
ago, when there was considerable
surplus all over the country.
The fresh egg market is barely
steady with receipts liberal. Ar-
rivals yesterday amounted to 1759
cases. On the exchange extras
dropped back to the 25-cent level
while all other grades held at for-
mer levels.

Undergrades of cube butter are
fractionally higher today. Extras
remain steady at 28 1/2 cents with
standards at the same level. Both
prime flats and flats are a half
higher at 28 and 27 cents respec-
tively.

New wool clips in the Yakima
section have practically been clean-
ed up, more than 500,000 pounds
having already been sold. With
shearing now in process in eastern
Washington buyers are turning
their attention to that section.
Eastern Oregon and Idaho will start
shearing soon, about two weeks
earlier than usual. The big Idaho
wool pool, sponsored by the Boise
bank will be brought to Portland
again this year, according to ad-
vices reaching local wool men. Re-
cent sales in Utah and Wyoming
around 42 to 34 1/2 cents indicates
a lower market this year.
Country dressed meats and poultry
remain generally steady at cur-
rent levels. Receipts moderate
with a light demand.
