PORTLAND, Ore., Apr. 1. (AP)—Ted Thye, Multnomah club instructor, defeated John Kilonis, Boston Greek, in two out of three falls here last night. John L. Sullivan's \$10,000 Belt Melted

PHILADELPHIA, Apr. 1. (AP)—What is said to have been the famous \$10,000 championship belt of John L. Sullivan has been melted at the mint here for the gold that was in it.

The belt with its 237 small diamonds missing, found its way to the mint through a Baltimore junk dealer who brought it here and received a check for a little more than \$800 for the precious metal it contained.

The emblem was presented to Sullivan by citizens of Boston in 1887.

PORTLAND GROUP GET CONTRACT TO CONSTRUCT GYM

EUGENE, Ore., Apr. 1. (AP)—Lumbermen's Trust company, Ralph Schmeelcke, and Foyles and Harbridge of Portland, bidding jointly, were awarded the \$150,000 bond issue providing for the construction of the proposed new University of Oregon basketball pavilion, at a meeting of the building committee of the university board of regents late yesterday afternoon. The bonds are to be sold at \$963 per \$1000, with interest at the rate of six per cent.

Bids for the construction of the pavilion will be opened at the comptroller's office at 11 a. m., April 21.
The regent building group also authorized the construction of four new handball courts in the men's outdoor gymnasium. Grading for a new freshman baseball diamond was also authorized. The women's athletic field will be completed, it was decided.

Auto Stage Rolls Down 60-Foot Embankment

SAN JOSE, Apr. 1. (AP)—Nine persons were injured, five seriously when a Santa Cruz-bound auto stage plunged off the Santa Cruz highway last night and rolled down a precipitous sixty-foot embankment after a collision with an auto driven by Joe Roubal, San Francisco, who was coming in the opposite direction. The bus was driven by H. A. Evans, of Santa Cruz.
It was necessary to stretch a rope from the highway down into the canyon to convey Evans and his eight passengers to the road.
