After seeing "Don't," Alf Goulding's production, based on a story by Rupert Hughes, which opened last night at the Sherry's theater, the old question is reviewed in the reviewer's mind as to which is the greater, a comedy drama filled with real humor, or a great tragedy. Remembering "Don't," it is clear, one is almost inclined to choose the comedy.

"Don't" is a well-knit story of the "goings on" of the younger generation, this time not among the New York smart set, but in a small town in New Jersey. The particular town does not matter, for it might be any in the United States.

If it weren't for the extremely clever work of Sally O'Neil as "Tessie Moffat" in the leading role, he would "steal" the picture.
