## DEMAND KEEPS MARKET FIRM

PORTLAND, Apr. 1. (AP)—Dairy products are holding firm in the local market in the face of increased receipts. This is due largely to the eastern demand for eggs, butter, meats and poultry.

On the dairy exchange, fresh standard extras and current receipts are up a cent with the former look at 26 cents and receipts at 23 cents. Firsts and mediums remain steady and unchanged. Receipts in the local market yesterday totaled 1425 cases with 10,402 cases reported in storage.

All grades of cube butter remained firm at former levels with a good print movement reported at the 42 cent price. Cream receipts are gaining slowly.

Along the street there is a brisk demand for all kinds of poultry. Bids for live poultry range from 22 to 24 cents on light hens to 27 and 28 cents for heavies. Broilers are bringing 25 to 40 cents according to weight and quality and capons 35 to 40 cents depending on size. Fancy dressed turkeys quoted all the way from 42 to 45 cents.

Country dressed veal, slightly easier but good calves still bringing 17 to 18 cents; choice light hogs firm at 18 1/2 to 19 cents with light offerings.

Consignment in southern markets with supplies piling up rapidly at San Francisco and Los Angeles, has slowed down the movement of potatoes in the local market. Buyers are still in the country, however, and have not reduced their bids. Clatsop county seems to be the center of interest and traders are numerous in the Washington section.

### Friends Seek Clemency For Chester C. Kubli

MEMPHIS, Apr. 1. (AP)—Friends and relatives of Chester C. Kubli, whose sentence of two years in state prison was recently confirmed by the supreme court, have launched a movement in this county to secure a parole or pardon. Kubli, a member of a prominent Oregon pioneer family, and former Applegate valley stockman, is now living near Eugene.

H. K. Kubli, of Portland, a relative, has asked Hercules Moore, of this city, former district attorney, who prosecuted Chester Kubli, to sign a recommendation for executive clemency.

ROSEBURG, Apr. 1. (AP)—William C. Winston, 88 years old, the father of the broccoli industry in Douglas county, passed away this morning at his home six miles south of Roseburg. He was born in Albany, N. Y., and came to Oregon in 1852. He was a resident of Douglas county since 1888. He engaged early in fruit raising and for many years was a grower of broccoli, demonstrating by experiments the adaptability of the crop to Douglas county soil and climate. From his experiments the industry has grown until nearly two carloads have been shipped this year.

## STOCK PRICES RECOVERING IN WALL STREET

NEW YORK, Apr. 1. (By the Associated Press)—Stock prices made further recovery in today's market when it became apparent that distress selling and the liquidation of large weakened speculative accounts had been completed at least temporarily. Flurries of selling took place at intervals, but offerings generally were well absorbed, scores of issues selling 1 to nearly 5 points above yesterday's (final) quotations.

The closing was strong. Additional short covering for over the holiday reduction in the call money rate to 4 per cent, and Wall street favorable reaction to the improved French financial situation gave impetus to the advance in the late trading.

## Hood River Asparagus Offered in La Grande

The first Oregon grown fresh asparagus made its appearance on La Grande's retail market today, coming from Hood River, and replacing the California asparagus which has been selling at 20 cents a pound. The Hood River product is marked at 25 cents a pound. Celery raised two cents a pound today and hot house tomatoes jumped from 25 to 40 cents.
