Preparing to Bring Art Library Here

Because Mrs. J. T. Longfellow was ill and unable to attend the meeting of the art department of the Neighborhood club yesterday afternoon, Mrs. H. H. Cleaver, chairman of the department, took charge of the program. Members of the department met in the Neighborhood club rooms at 2:15 o'clock.

Four of the greatest American artists of the impressionistic school were described by Mrs. Cleaver, Hassan, Twachtman, Metcalf and Weir being the artists chosen. These men were members of the organization known as "Ten American Artists" formed for the purpose of exhibiting their own works.

During the business session, which followed the study hour, important business was discussed. Because of her extensive experience in art work Mrs. E. P. Mossman was unanimously elected general chairman of the art exhibit, which is to be brought to La Grande under the auspices of the department. This picture library, composed of twenty-seven canvases valued at forty thousand dollars, will be shown at Honan hall and will arrive in La Grande about the last week of April. It will be shown here during vacation week, when women from over all the state of Oregon will meet for the annual convention of Women's clubs. The library is being sent out by the American Federation of Women's clubs at Washington, D. C., and will be in La Grande about ten days.

Committees to have charge of the exhibition were appointed yesterday. The committee on study, which will gather all material pertaining to the works of the artists whose canvases will be shown, and place it in the public library for anyone wishing to familiarize themselves with the artists before the arrival of the canvases, is composed of Mrs. H. H. Cleaver and Mrs. J. D. Lynch.

Mrs. Cleaver, chairman of the art department; Mrs. L. B. Moe, chairman of the Rambler's art club; Mrs. A. T. Hill, of the Art Research club and Mrs. L. L. Douglas, of the teachers' art study class, were appointed as a committee of guides to see that guides are provided each day to conduct and explain the pictures to visitors. Arrangements are also being made for an evening to be open

to the public. This will be in charge of Mrs. Mossman. Mrs. J. D. Lynch is chairman of the committee on finance, and Mrs. Itay Murphy is head of the hanging committee. This committee will see that the pictures are properly hung as to light.

The insurance committee which will secure insurance on the library while here is headed by Mrs. C. E. Happersett, and Mrs. Robert Kakin is chairman of the publicity committee.

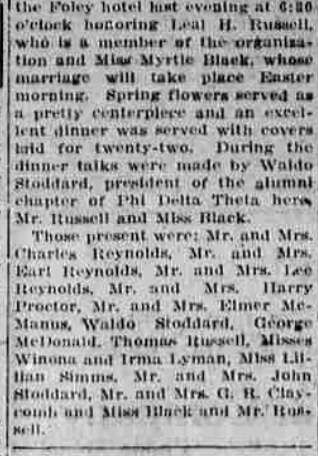
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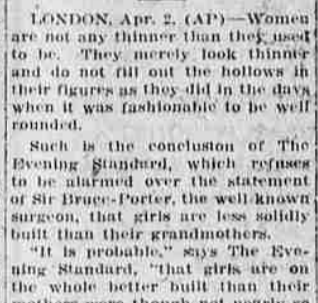

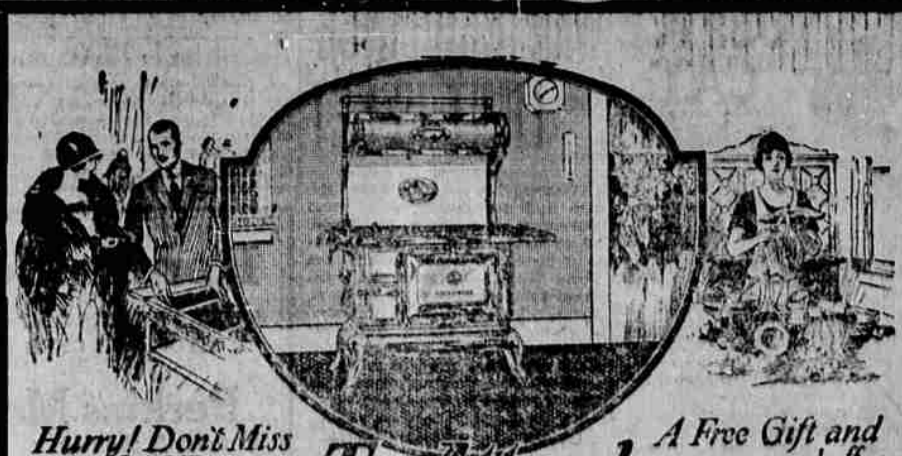
