MEATS GO AT TOP PRICES

PORTLAND, Ore., Apr. 2. (AP)—Articles of country produce along the coast during the last few days have moved up promptly and today with the Easter buying rush practically over, the market is almost bare and in good shape.

Country dressed meats cleaned up at top prices. Veal was trifle draggier the first of the week, but the market strengthened, and choice light calves were selling at 13 to 14 1/2 cents today. Choice light hogs cleaned up at 14 1/2 to 15 cents.

There was almost a shortage of spring lamb this year with hardly enough arriving in the local market to supply the demand. Prices, however, remained reasonable in the face of moderate receipts. At the yards, springers brought 12 to 13 1/2 cents on the hoof, and dressed at 20 to 21 cents.

Butcher lamb markets were draggier due to the Easter season. Jewish holidays and fast days prior to Easter, California lambs sold at 12 1/2 per hundredweight in the eastern markets with 15 refrigerator cars shipped during the past three weeks.

Local demand has kept the fresh egg market firm, although receipts have been heavy and outside markets unsettled. Fresh standard extra still quoted at 24 cents on the exchange while firsts are 2 cents higher at 25 cents.

Butter market remains steady in the face of increased production. Country receipts yesterday totaled 22,625 pounds while 16,265 pounds were manufactured by local creameries. Cube prices remain steady and unchanged on the local dairy board.

NOTICE RESTRICTING GAME FISH BAG LIMIT
