Luncheon Honors Mr. and Mrs. Bollons

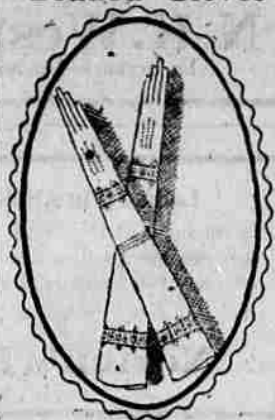

Sister Mary Says:

Breakfast—Apples, cereal cooked with figs, thin cream, poached eggs on graham toast, milk, coffee.

Luncheon—Left-over lamb baked with rice, spinach, orange cake pudding, whole wheat bread, milk, tea.

Dinner—Dressed port-house steak, French fried potatoes, creamed cauliflower, date and orange salad, graham roots, rice pudding, milk, coffee.

The luncheon dish of rice and lamb uses up the "left-over" from the previous dinner. The dessert is also a left-over of sorts in that it uses stale sponge cake for its foundation. Left-overs often prove a difficult problem for many women, particularly those with "steak and roasts" husbands. If by clever manipulation, left-overs are used up for the noon meal, friend husband may continue to enjoy his steaks and roasts and by the same token "son" be taught to eat those dishes his father scorned.

Orange Cake Pudding

Two cups stale sponge cake crumbs, 1 cup milk, 1 cup orange juice, 1 tablespoon grated orange rind, 4 tablespoons sugar, 3 eggs. The cake should be pulled into coarse crumbs. Combine sugar and grated orange rind. Pour milk over crumbs and add sugar. Beat eggs until very light and stir into first mixture. Add orange juice, mix thoroughly and turn into a buttered baking dish. Bake in a moderate oven for 40 minutes or until firm to the touch. Serve warm or cold with or without whipped cream. A boiled custard sauce is good with this pudding.—(Copyright, 1926, NEA Service, Inc.)

Modern Cave Dwellers Discovered Near Berlin

BERLIN, Apr. 3. (AP)—More than 200 modern cave dwellers have been found living in the ash and refuse dumps on the outskirts of Berlin amid surroundings more squalid than those of primitive man.

Poverty stricken families, some with as many as four children, evicted from homes for non-payment of rent, have survived the winter in one or two underground rooms furnished entirely from rubbish heaps. Discarded steel cans were used as beds. The cooking utensils consisted of patched up pots and pans. Shredded carpets covered the dirt floor. Logs and pine box boards had been hewn into rafters which kept the dirt from caving down upon the occupants.

City authorities have undertaken to find new abodes for the colony. There is a jobless village of more than 2000 inhabitants living in one-room tar paper shacks on city property.
