WHEAT PRICES STAGE RALLY

CHICAGO, Apr. 2. (By the Associated Press)—Wheat prices rallied at the last today, influenced by predictions of a good sized decrease of the United States visible supply total on Monday and by week-end coming up of accounts forecasts of further moisture over Sunday failed to act as an offset and as did expectation that the government crop report next week would make a bearish showing.

Wheat closed firm at the same as Thursday's finish to 1/2c higher; corn 1 1/2 to 2 1/2c down and oats 1/2 to 3/4c and 1/2c off.

CHICAGO, Apr. 2. (By the Associated Press)—Opening wheat quotations unchanged to 1/2c lower, May, new, \$1.55 1/2 to \$1.56 1/2 and July \$1.53 to \$1.54 1/2, were followed by a material decline all around.

Alleged Forger Under Arrest in Seattle

SEATTLE, Apr. 2. (AP)—Edmond T. Sumpter was under arrest today awaiting extradition to Portland, Ore., where he is wanted on an indictment charging forgery of a U. S. treasury check. He was arrested immediately after completing a sentence for forgery at the state reformatory at Monroe, Wash.

Sumpter is accused of forging the signature of Thomas Sumpter to a war risk insurance check for \$24.58 at Hermiston, Ore. He pleaded guilty before the United States commissioner in Everett and later in federal court in Seattle. He said he wanted to go to Portland to plead to an indictment against him.

Stribling Will Fight Johnny Risko May 11

NEW YORK, Apr. 2. (AP)—Negotiations for a match between Johnny Risko, Cleveland heavyweight, and Young Stribling of Georgia, at Madison Square Garden on May 14 were completed today by Jess McMahon, Garden matchmaker. McMahon came to terms with Risko's manager by long distance telephone after previously reaching an agreement with Pa. Stribling. The match will be for 10 rounds.

Stribling will step out of the light heavyweight class in meeting Risko, a rugged 190-pounder, who figured recently in sensation at matches with Jack Delaney and Paul Berlenbach, at the garden. Risko lost the decision to Delaney but defeated and nearly knocked out Berlenbach.

CHAPMAN FIGHT FOR LIFE SEEMS DOOMED TO FAIL

HARTFORD, Conn., Apr. 2. (AP)—Judge Newell H. Jennings destroyed Gerald Chapman's last hope of escaping the gallows Monday night through court action, by ruling today that the new evidence presented by his attorneys was not worthy of hearing in a formal motion for a new trial.

Chapman's only chance now lies in the board of pardons or an executive reprieve.

Judge Jennings said he would see the governor and talk the case over.

Latin Heavyweights Will Battle Tonight

BUENOS AIRES, Apr. 2. (AP)—An audience of 70,000 persons, a record for a boxing match in Argentina, is expected at the battle tonight between Luis Angel Firpo, of Argentina, and Emilio Spalla, of Italy, the second encounter between the two Latin heavyweights within two years.

The fight will be limited to twelve rounds instead of fifteen as at first announced. The two men are expected to enter the ring about 9:30 p. m., New York time.

Doug and Mary Sail Today for Europe

NEW YORK, Apr. 2. (AP)—Douglas Fairbanks and Mary Pickford sailed for Europe today aboard the liner Conte Biancamano for a year's stay. Mr. Fairbanks said they possibly might remain abroad for two years and that he and Mary would produce a film in which both will take leading roles.

They are accompanied by Mrs. Fairbanks' mother, Mrs. Sherwood Pickford, and Miss Gwynne Pickford. Mrs. Pickford was so ill from an attack of indigestion that she was carried aboard the liner.

While abroad the party will reside at Monte Carlini, near Bologna, Italy.

Resurvey of Umpqua River Jetty Is Asked

WASHINGTON, Apr. 2. (AP)—Resurvey of the incomplete Umpqua river jetty projects in Oregon by army engineers was asked today by the house rivers and harbors committee. The action was taken after Representatives Crum-packer and Hawley, Oregon republicans, asked the committee's approval of government aid to complete clearing the channel.

Shipping has been tied up since war price conditions forced suspension of the project, the Oregon members said, urging government aid as an emergency necessity.

RADIO DEBATE

EUGENE, Ore., Apr. 2. (AP)—Debate teams of the University of Southern California and the University of Oregon will speak tonight over radio KGW in Portland as an annual feature of the Oregon forum, scheduled. James Johnson and Donald Bechar will represent Oregon against Leland Tullman and William Berger of the California institution.

The Oregon men will uphold the affirmative side of the question: "Resolved: That war, except in case of invasion of internal rebellion, should be declared by a direct vote of the people of the United States."

Mill Feeds Drop as Wheat Market Weakens

PORTLAND, Ore., Apr. 2. (AP)—All scratches and mill feeds are \$1 a ton lower today in the local market due to the weakness in wheat. Barley now quoted at \$40, corn at \$34 and wheat at \$55; mill feed \$27; middlings \$41 and scratch feed at \$55 a ton.

The 15 cent advance in the local sugar market is generally effective this morning. New prices on best cane now \$5.90 with beet at \$5.80 a sack.

Local hide dealers have reduced their bids again with salted hides now down to six cents and green hides at five cents. Offers on dry hides are down 2 cents a pound. Calf skins are unchanged.

Local produce markets reflect a holiday atmosphere today with values more or less on a nominal basis. There was no session yesterday or today on the dairy exchange and both butter and eggs prices remain unchanged at former levels.

Closing prices on cube butter were: Extras 35 1/2; standards 33 1/2; prime firsts 28; and firsts 27c. Prints were unchanged at the 43 cent level.

Closing egg prices were: Fresh standard extras 26c; firsts 25c; mediums and current receipts 23c. Country dressed meats and poultry cleaned up at steady prices to the holiday trade and houses along the street have little or no carry-over. Trading was moderate today.

REALIZING SALES IN WALL STREET EASE OFF PRICES

NEW YORK, Apr. 2. (AP)—Stock prices turned heavy again today as week-end realizing sales appeared on the market in large volume. While there was no resumption of the urgent liquidation which crushed the market early in the week, stocks of all descriptions eased off gradually after an early period of strength.

Favorable inferences were drawn from the federal reserve figures showing a large reduction in brokerage loans, reports of new oil mergers and the resumption of equipment buying by the railroads on a large scale, but the buying movement in standard rails and industrial was checked when selling pressure was redirected against the motor, merchandising and food shares.

The closing was heavy. Total sales approximated 800,000 shares.

DEFICIT SHOWN

NEW YORK, Apr. 2. (AP)—The actual condition of clearing house banks and trust companies for the week (five days) shows a deficit in reserve of \$34,159,500. This is a decrease in reserve of \$49,732,170 compared with last week when excess reserve of \$15,573,670 was reported.
