### Theatergoers See New Charles Ray in "Some Pinkies"

A new Charles Ray, and yet an old one, was introduced to motion picture fans last night at the Sherway theatre.

The occasion was the opening of the Chadwick production of "Some Pinkies", starring Charles Ray.

The old Ray returned in his familiar and beloved characterization of the small town country boy.

This is a welcome relief after the surfeit of pictures about "the big wicked city" and "the modern jazz age." It is clean, as are all Ray pictures, wholesome, entertaining, and a real dramatic treat.

The title is derived from the theme of the story which centers around a cop on the famous Thanksgiving Day vigilante. One of the most spectacular scenes in the picture shows a view of a huge pile of pumpkins said to be thirty tons in weight.

A highlight of the story is a most realistic fire in which the heroine seems to be actually enveloped by gigantic flames. This trick is a startling one and deserves a special niche in the Hall of Famous Thrills.

This reviewer, however, was most indelibly impressed with the toy-making of the star. It seems to me that Ray has emerged in an entirely new field of histrionism. He makes a romantic and passionate lover, yet sincere and warm in his affection. The fervor with which he tells the heroine of his love, the silent, dreamy rubbing of cheeks bespeak a man who knows the depths and breadth of that fantastic thing we call "love."

James Thompson, a former Christie comedy player, makes her debut as a Charles Ray leading woman. She is beautiful and talented and knows well the art of "feeding." As Mary Griggs she shows unlimited possibilities in dramatic roles. George Fawcett as Jake Hossom, the hero's father, adds another vivid portrayal to his long list of character delineations. "Comedy showing 'Last of the Mohicans'."
