Chinese Air Raids on Tartar City Protested

PEKING, Apr. 6, (AP)—The air raids continued against the Khomeichun (national army) barracks in the Tartar city for the last four days by the Chinese "puppet" forces, brought a protest from the foreign diplomats today. The protest is against the repeated violation of the diplomatic quarter of the city by the flights over it of the military planes. While determined to maintain neutrality in the civil war which prevails, the ministers asserted they feel justified in reminding the government of its responsibility toward the friendly powers whose nationals are endangered.

COURT RULING BLOW TO DRYS

WASHINGTON, Apr. 6 (AP)—Prohibition officials showed considerable concern today over the decision of the federal circuit court of appeals in New York yesterday declaring treasury regulations for revocation of alcohol denaturing permits without a hearing were illegal.

At first glance the decision was regarded as a severe blow to enforcement plans. A preliminary estimate indicated that under the more than 213 permits which have been revoked since last November would have to be reconsidered and formal hearings allowed in each case. This weapon has been the chief reliance of Assistant Secretary Andrews in charge of enforcement of his fight against diversion of alcohol.

The La Grande member of the board served as president three years ago. Frank Ingalls, of Durar, has been appointed to fill the vacancy, but has not yet accepted the place, Mr. Reynolds said. The new vice president has been on the board for 11 years.

Egyptian Government Gives Aid to Homeless

SAN FRANCISCO, Apr. 6, (AP)—Pacific coast league: Hollywood. San Francisco Seals game postponed, rain.

CARLO, Egypt, Apr. 6, (AP)—

The Egyptian government has organized relief measures for the 4,000 persons rendered homeless when fire swept the village of Bagin-El-Kon, six miles from Tanton. At least thirty-five persons perished in the fire, which started at noon Saturday when a sudden change in the wind carried sparks from a household fire, kindled outside the dwelling, to the straw-covered roof.

The government has supplied tents and flour for the homeless. Village fires in Egypt are generally caused as in this case, by a change in the wind sending sparks from domestic fires to the highly inflammable roofs.

WASHINGTON, Apr. 6 (AP)—Bid of \$1,500,000 for the five liners operated out of Seattle by the Admiral-Orion Line was submitted to the shipping board today by K. Stanley Dollar. The figure is an increase of \$1,500,000 over his previous offer.
