CHICAGO, Apr. 8. (AP)—Five world records have been broken so far in the National A. A. U. championship swimming meet. Three were smashed Tuesday night and two more fell by the wayside last night when Ewek Haidenmacher, German champion, and Miss Agnes Geraghty, of New York, established new marks.

The Cincinnati Y. M. C. A. team will enter tonight's competition with an advantage of twelve points over the nearest rival.

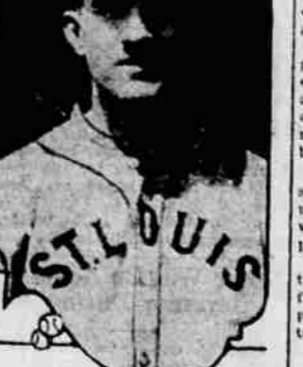
Negotiations are under way for games with high school teams.
