Hoot Gibson Is Funny and Fast in "Chip of Flying U"

Most Hoot Gibson—comedian. The intrepid westerner takes his place with any of the screen's most popular fun-makers in "Chip of the Flying U," the latest, Universal production starring Gibson, now showing at the Star Theater for three days.

Hoot, with his puzzled, disconcerting countenance plays the role of a bashful, unlikely cowpuncher, who gets into all sorts of scrapes because he is afraid of women and into still more misadventure when he does finally fall in love with one.

Hoot and his gang of cowpunchers, principally Mark Hamilton, Harry Todd and Gilbert "Pee Wee" Holmes, provides laughs from start to finish.

In addition to its countless funny situations, "Chip of the Flying U," possesses some real action, and thrills and suspense that belated the humorous scenes. Gibson, capable actor and comedian that he is, can still match his prowess in the saddle against any of the screen's western stars, and he does some remarkable riding in the picture.

Another touch which makes "Chip" an unusual picture is the forethought of the director in actually having some work going on about the ranch. Most cattle ranches in the movies would appear to consist of nothing but plots, wild rides, shooting scrapes and galloping poses.

None of these things occur on the Flying U. Instead the cowpunchers, Hoot and all, work for their living, just as a farmer, not on ranches in Texas and Arizona must do, and one's enjoyment of the picture is considerably heightened by the feeling that the story

might really have happened. Virginia Brown Faire plays opposite Gibson in the leading feminine role, while Philo McCullough, DeWitt Jennings and others, are in the supporting cast.

A gag comedy is also being shown.

Motor Bus Service to Replace Street Cars

EUGENE, Ore., Apr. 8. (AP)—Motor bus service between Eugene and Springfield to replace the street car system between the two cities will be inaugurated Friday, morning according to T. L. Billingsley, superintendent of the electric lines of the company in Oregon. A bus with a capacity of 25 passengers is expected to arrive here from Portland today, and will be placed on the run early Friday morning.

The change in service is made necessary by reason of beginning of construction work on the new bridge over the Willamette river at Springfield, to replace the old interurban line bridge.

The old buses will follow the former street car schedule.
