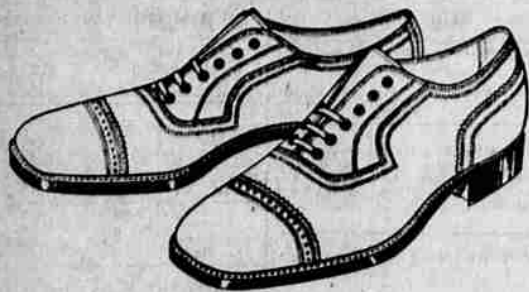

VALUES DROP IN PORTLAND

PORTLAND, Ore., Apr. 8. (AP)—With the arrival of the first warm days and heavy meat receipts from the country, the long expected drop in values took place and prices tumbled from the extreme high level that they have maintained for the past several weeks.

Today the market on country dressed veal is in a demoralized condition. Practically every home along the street has a half dozen or more calves hanging on their hooks, some carried over from yesterday without any offers.

Good calves this morning were offered at 14 cents and it would take a real fancy veal to bring 16 1/2 cents. Others are offered as low as 15 cents.

Hogs, too, participated in the break although receipts are not so liberal and the decline less drastic. Today choice light pork is offered at 18 to 19 1/2 cents with good hogs as low as 17 1/2 cents. The demand however, is slow.

Commission men were busy today getting their meat arrivals in to the cooler after the sluggish condition of the market was realized.

Eggs Recover.

Top grade eggs have recovered their previous loss on the dairy exchange and today are again posted at 26 cents. Other grades are steady and unchanged. Yesterday's arrivals were reported at 17 1/2 cents with 15,383 cases in local storage showing 782 cases went in to the coolers.

Butter steadily improving but are well taken care of. Yesterday's receipts reported at 27.651 pounds with 14,231 pounds manufactured by local creameries.

Live poultry is holding steady in the local market. Receipts are well absorbed and prices fully maintained.

EXPORT SALES BOOST WHEAT IN CHICAGO MARKET.
CHICAGO, Apr. 8. (AP)—Big export sales of North American wheat, upwards of 1,000,000 bushels together with decreasing domestic stocks of wheat both in the southwest and northwest gave decided momentum to upward swings in the wheat market today during the late dealings. There were also indications that buying of United States wheat was in progress for shipment at the opening of navigation on the Great Lakes. On the other hand, the government crop report to be given out tomorrow is expected to show a relatively high position.
Wheat closed unsettled, 1 to 1 1/2c net higher, corn 3/4 to 5/8c up and oats at 3/4 to 5/8c gain.

NEW YORK. Apr. 8. (AP)—The development of a brisk demand for the Van Swearingen issue this afternoon, following the announcement of an agreement by the promoters of the "Nickel Plate" merger and the minority stockholders committee of the Chesapeake and Ohio lifted the market out of the doldrums in which it had been foundering all morning. Renewed efforts of bear traders to bring about further liquidation of the motor shares met with considerable success, a number being driven down two to four points with selling accompanied by a revival of rumors that many dealers were again overstocked with new cars.
The closing was heavy. Prices dipped downward again in the final dealing when heavy selling broke out in a number of specialties.
Sales approximated 1,100,000 shares.

CONTRACTORS IN SALEM DECLARE FOR OPEN SHOP

FORMAL DECREE OF FORECLOSURE IS FILED TODAY

SALEM, Ore., Apr. 8. (AP)—In face of the biggest building year in her history, with over \$2,000,000 in building operations in view for the year and some of the biggest construction projects not yet included in the list, 38 contractors and builders of the city last night formed an organization declaring for an open shop. While the move has been brewing here for over two months, it is said to have been accelerated by a move under way to form common laborers' union which would call for a minimum wage scale of \$5 a day for all unskilled labor, pick and shovel men and similar employes on buildings operations.

SALEM, Ore., Apr. 8. (AP)—Contention of both sides are partially upheld in a decree by Judge L. H. McMahon of the circuit court today in the attack of initiators of the granite hydroelectric bill upon the ballot title for the bill as prepared by Attorney General Van Winkle. The main attack of the initiators, acting through Wadsworth Anderson, of Albany, was on the word "bonding" in the short title which read: "Oregon water, hydroelectric and water, water power and bonding acts." This is changed in the decree to read "Oregon state water, water power and hydroelectric energy act."

NEW YORK, Apr. 8. (AP)—All officers of the Southern Pacific company were re-elected at the annual reorganization meeting of the directors today. James S. Alcox, under, chairman of the National Bank of Commerce of New York, was added to the executive committee.

DEMOCRATS MAKE RECOMMENDATIONS AT OREGON CITY

OREGON CITY, Ore., Apr. 8. (AP)—Clackamas county democrats meeting late yesterday endorsed the principle of income tax, opposed entry of the state into the hydro-electric business, and favored reduction of auto license fees and abolition of many state boards.
Bert E. Haney was suggested as democratic candidate for U. S. senator and in case he does not enter the contest, the following were proposed as alternatives:
Marshall N. Dana, Portland; H. G. Starkweather, Clackamas; and Hugh McLean, Coos county.
W. C. Callerson was suggested as democratic candidate for representative of the first congressional district.

Road Houses Ordered To Obtain Licenses

PORTLAND, Ore., Apr. 8. (AP)—Proprietors of all Multnomah county road houses where dancing is permitted must apply to the county commissioners before next Wednesday for dance licenses. Those who fail to make the necessary application will be arrested by the sheriff's office if they continue to allow public dancing in their resorts. This was the announcement made today by county officials.
The action was taken as the result of the recent opinion of presiding Circuit Judge Stevenson holding that road houses which permit public dancing are dance halls within the meaning of the state law, and that they may be regulated as such.

Ex-Prohibition Agent Sentenced in Hillsboro

HILLSBORO, Ore., Apr. 8. (AP)—Earl C. Becker, former state prohibition agent was today sentenced to six months in jail and to pay a fine of \$500 when he pleaded guilty to possession of liquor. He was paroled on payment of \$150. Becker and another prohibition agent, James Hinton, were arrested at Beaverton last month on a charge of liquor possession. Hinton will be tried within a few days.
