HOFF, NORWEGIAN VAULTER, BREAKS TENTH RECORD

CHICAGO, Apr. 10. (AP)—Charles Hoff, Norwegian star, again has demonstrated his ability to break the world's pole vault record, apparently at will.

The slender son of the fjords cleared the bar here last night at 13 feet, 8 1/4 inches, adding three-quarters of an inch to his previous high mark. It is the tenth time he had broken the record for a total of more than 5 inches in his indoor track season now concluded.
Hoff's opponents were eliminated at 13 feet. Hoff easily cleared 13 feet 4 inches and then ordered the bar raised for an attempt at a new record. On the first attempt he went over the scantling easily. His latest performance featured the annual meet of the Chicago chapter of the American Institute of Banking.

In approximately a dozen performances since he came to the United States early in the season Hoff has raised the record from 15 feet to the height he made last night. Nelson D. Sherrill of New York held the previous record of exactly 15 feet made on March 7, 1925.
