MARKET OPENS STEADY TODAY

PORTLAND, Ore., Apr. 12. (AP)—Produce markets opened steady today at Saturday's closing prices. Early receipts were moderate with trading more or less inactive. Commission houses along front street are still loaded with country calves coming over from last week and little improvement is expected in the market unless arrivals during the next day or so are unusually light.

The market for country dressed hogs seems to be holding fairly steady in spite of the slump in veal. Receipts are light and choice light pork moves readily at 17 to 18 cents, depending on weight and quality.

Not enough poultry arrived on the street this morning to relieve the shortage and the market is still firm at current levels. Butter and eggs markets are steady with prices well maintained. Both lines are going into the cooler and this together with a good shipping outlet to the south, keeps supplies well cleaned up here. Prices on butter: Extras and standards 28 1/2c; prime firsts 33c and firsts 27c. Prints still quoted at the 41 cent level with butterfat 41 cents in the country and 42c delivered Portland.

Prices on fresh eggs: Extras 26c; firsts 24c; mediums and current receipts 22c.

CHICAGO, Apr. 12. (AP)—With speculators inclined mostly to sell and with buying of only a scattered sort in evidence the wheat market today was inclined to sag. The weather was more favorable north-west as well as west and southwest. May delivery however requesting wheat already on hand acted tight throughout the day and went to a wider premium over July 1 1/2c. Wheat closing unsettled 1/2c to 1 1/4c net lower; corn unchanged to 1/4c off and oats at 1/4c decline to an equal gain.
