Breakfast—Grapefruit sections, broiled bacon, poached eggs with spinach on toast, rolled oats, nuts, milk, coffee.

Luncheon—Mock oyster cream soup, croissants, date graham bread, and butter sandwiches, sliced oranges, milk, tea.

Dinner—Tomato bouillon, mock sausages, potatoes au gratin, buttered cauliflower, jellied fruit salad, rye bread, milk, coffee.

The date bread and butter sandwiches are served with the oranges suggested in the luncheon menu. The term "sliced" oranges is rather misleading since oranges properly prepared in this manner are not really sliced at all. The fruit is carefully peeled and then each section of orange are the "slices."

Mock Oyster Cream Soup One bunch salsify, 1 cup chicken or veal stock, 2 tablespoons butter, 2 tablespoons flour, 1 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon pepper, 1/2 teaspoon celery seed, 1 egg 1 cup thin cream.

Wash and scrape salsify and slice into acidulated water. Drain and put into sauce pan with 2 cups cold water. Bring to the boiling point and simmer until ve-

getable is soft. Rub through a colander and return to sauce pan with stock. Rub butter and flour together until perfectly smooth. Work in salt, pepper and celery seed. Add soup and salsify mixture. Boil. When ready to serve add cream and egg beaten together. Stir over the fire until very hot but not let boil. Serve at once.
