mind both citizens and visitors of the city's slogan and uniform advertising boards of the merchants might be made to include propaganda for the flower exposition. Boy Scouts, she said, could be enlisted as weed cutters and lookouts for improvements. Tactful signs on faraway highways might invite the tourists to La Grande.

How trees planted in the parking at the intersection of lots can be made to wood the streets with out obstructing the view was told by Mrs. A. T. Hill. She advocated the use of ornamental shrubbery between the trees. The plan outlined by the club years ago for planting a single variety of trees along each street to give a unified impression has been carried out with happy results in many parts of the city, she said.

Favor Dahlia and Aster.
 Mrs. Ray Murphy, chairman of the civic improvement committee, suggested the dahlia and the aster as flowers that might successfully be designated the official blossom of La Grande, since both thrive so luxuriously in the soil and climate here.

"I should like first of all to see La Grande do away with her tree untidiness," declared Mrs. Turner Oliver, and the room broke into applause.

Such wholesale slaughter of shade trees is both distressing and unnecessary, she continued, imploring the clubwomen to use their influence to stop the destruction. Mrs. Oliver suggested the Oregon maples as trees that would repay cultivation in this part of the country.

BURY WIZARD AS SUN SETS

SANTA ROSA, Cal., Apr. 14. (AP)—Just as the last rays of the setting sun brighten for a moment the flowers in the gardens of Santa Rosa, Luther Burbank will go to his final rest today, borne on the hands of old and trusted friends to a quiet grave under a Lebanon cedar he planted many years ago.

A strange mixture of agnostics and religion dictated the sentiment of those who gathered to mourn his passing. Friends from far and near thronged here when they heard of his death early last Sunday morning, but only his widow, his sister and a chosen few of those with whom he lived and labored will be permitted to witness the final scene.

Preferred Simple Burial.
 All were invited to public services among the living monuments to his memory in the trees and flowers of Doyle Park, but Burbank, unostentatious in life, preferred that his burial be clothed with simplicity.

There was no long procession through the Burbank home past the casket. No requiem music was arranged for the commitment to the grave. At the public exercises, 3,000 school children will sing. Judge Ben F. Lindsey of Denver, mentor of childhood, and a lifelong friend of the dead, is here to deliver the eulogy. The Rev. C. S. Dutton of San Francisco, who married Mr. and Mrs. Burbank 10 years ago, will represent the church of which Burbank was a member, but an admitted critic.

Christians Pay Tribute.
 And besides the few self-confessed agnostics who had come to pay tribute, were many devout Christians who regarded the agnostic views of Mr. Burbank as matters that could not interfere with their friendship.

Boy scouts of the Luther Burbank council of Santa Rosa formed a guard around his home today.

intimate contact with liquor?" "Of course it does," replied General Andrews.

Injurious to Morals.
 "Isn't it promoting the ultimate destruction of the morals of the families when this goes on?"

"It is seriously injurious to their morals," Andrews said. "Would it not be much better, if it is not to be much better, could go out some place and get his grog than to bring the mulch home and distill it there?"

"I can't answer that directly. I think a full survey of those things should be made."

Discussing how illicit liquor is made, General Andrews said: "You know what an Oregon still is?"

"No," said Andrews. "Well, I have a drawing here that a marine gave me," the senator continued. "And what a whiskey doesn't know about getting whiskey nobody needs hope to know. I say that with all respect to the nurses. They are good fighters and hard drinkers."

Senator Reed then went into description of the drawing, showing how liquor was made with a pan and a couple of bricks.

"But that produces liquor full of other," objected Andrews. "Yes, very dangerous," returned Reed, "and one unwarlike full of that could look a regiment of other fighting men."

"I might make it two," the general said. "You understand now, this kind of a still."

"Yes and it may be useful to you when you get back into the service, and you don't have any Melly Butler to supervise you."

INDIANS GO ON DRINKING ORGY

KLAMATH FALLS, Apr. 14. (AP)—Freed from restraint by reason of a recent decision of Circuit Judge A. L. Leavitt, Indians of the Klamath Indian reservation are indulging in an orgy of drinking and carousing in the reservation towns of Healy and Bly and are daring peace officers in those towns to arrest them, according to calls received here by E. L. Elliott, prosecuting attorney.

According to Judge Leavitt's decision, made public Monday, the tribesmen are wards of the government, protected by treaty, and immune from arrest by any one but United States officials as long as they remain on the reservation.

Fear that the safety of white residents of the reservation was menaced was expressed by Elliott, who said that if the demonstration continued he would be forced to ask that United States officers be sent from Portland, or that local peace officers be empowered to act as United States deputies.

Auto Dealers Worried

In the opinion of Attorney Elliott, all Indian divorces recently granted by local courts are illegal and not binding, because not granted by United States jurists.

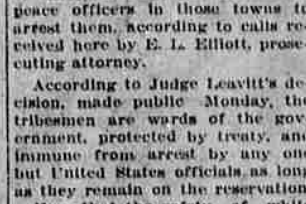
