PLANT WIZARD LAID TO REST

SANTA ROSA, Cal., Apr. 12. (AP)—A cedar of Lebanon across the road from a vine covered cottage in the middle of a garden had taken on a living significance to the citizens of Santa Rosa today.

For under its protecting branches, Arthur Burbank, friend of every living thing, was laid to rest when the sun sank behind the green hills in the west last night. No man-corned nature the spot where the great horticulturist found his grave, much for Burbank, asked that a growing tree be his only headstone.

The burial was simple as the funeral of the masses of unknown people. Yet Burbank's fame went out to the ends of the earth. The green and gold that produced their fruits and flowers because of his efforts speak even where his name is unknown.

Burbank was born to his grave by old workers and living monuments down a highway strewn with flowers. His widow, his sister, Mrs. Martha Brown, and a few close friends followed the casket. No widow's weeds were worn by Mrs. Burbank and the coffin was the only similar evidence of bereavement, but the tears of the mourners testified to the love for the dead.

The name of Gertrude Beugnot Talbot singing "Sister, Thrushes Among the Grass," was all that was heard by most of the men, women and children who crowded the spaces of the Burbank yard to observe the burial. Traffic policemen and fire sports kept back the crowds in the successful little procession moved from the Burbank house to the grave under the tree. The Rev. Calvin S. S. Dutton of the First Unitarian Church, of San Francisco, read a brief prayer. Judge Ben B. Lindsey of Denver spoke a tender eulogy of the dead, and the burial was over.
