TRACK MEN TO GO TO BAKER

La Grande tracksters look upon their coming meet with Baker Saturday at 2 p. m., over there with some apprehension. They have heard that the copper jackets are all polished up for the competition but they have no definite line on the kind of track records the Bulldogs are piling up this year. Some pretty fair athletes came out of Baker for the Eastern Oregon meet last year, they remember.

Coach Thorson Bennett, for his part, is not particularly perturbed, although he said this morning he was afraid Captain Sherwood might not be able to compete. Sherwood, who was high point man at Union last week and won first place in the discus throw, has been ill and absent from school since Monday.

Kiefer has been getting good distance in the discus class all week and ought to be able to take first place even if Sherwood should be unable to go, the coach observed this morning. Kiefer won third at Union.

In the javelin ranks, Keown has made a great showing. While he is handicapped in the way of height he has developed such form that he out-distances the taller men.

Brown is expected to improve his time in the mile race, Bennett said today. He was second at Union, where first time registered at 5:12.

PHILADELPHIA, Apr. 15. (AP)—With the largest entry list in its history, the thirty-second annual Pennsylvania relay carnival will be held here tomorrow and Saturday.

More than 500 universities, colleges, preparatory and high schools from all sections of the country are entered in 96 events. There will be one Canadian participant, Hamilton Collegiate Institute of Ontario. The carnival will bring more than 3000 athletes to Franklin field.

Five members of the Western conference have made entries and the Pacific coast and the Rocky mountain district also are represented.

The Decathlon championship, which carries with it the national collegiate title, will be run off tomorrow morning. Twelve men have entered.

PORTLAND, Ore., Apr. 15. (AP)—Ted Thye, Portland light heavyweight wrestler, defeated Billy Edwards, of Kansas City, in two straight falls here last night. Thye used the wristlock to pin Edwards both times. The first fall came after 41 minutes 46 seconds and the second in 3 minutes 15 seconds.

WALTER JOHNSON IS GREATEST OF FIVE SUPERMEN

NEW YORK, Apr. 15. (AP)—Last of five master craftsmen to defy with undimmed brilliance the fates of time and youth, Walter Johnson, pitcher, is to complete a twenty-year pitching career.

He has resumed his place on the firing line within a few days after the passing of Jay Gould as court tennis king and the defeat of Willie Hoppe as 18.1 ball line billiard champion.

Gould, Hoppe and Johnson arose

to greatness with two supermen—Frank Kramer, the cyclist, and Ty Cobb, of the mighty willow.

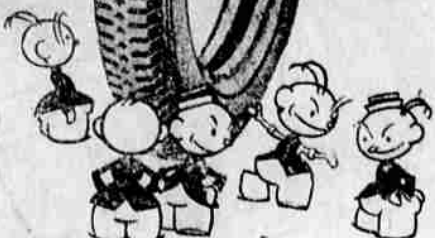
Cobb on Decline
All but Johnson finally have slipped from the pinnacle. Cobb remains in baseball but he has indicated that his appearances in the lineup this year are to be less frequent than ever.

Gould, who is 38 years old, held his national title for 12 consecutive years and was defeated only once. Kramer retired in 1922 after winning the American cycling title 18 times. Hoppe for 18 years was a billiard champion. Cobb has led the American league batsmen for eight consecutive seasons and 11

times in 12 years. Pugilism, tennis and golf have failed to produce champions whose careers match these five athletic marvels.
