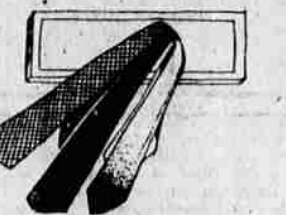


Manhattan Shirts

SUGAR PRICES ARE SOARING

PORTLAND, Ore., Apr. 15. (AP)—Sugar prices are soaring again. Local jobbers have announced an advance of 15 cents a sack effective at the opening of trade Friday morning. The new wholesale price on the best cane granulated will be \$6.05 a sack with beet at \$5.85. The advance in the local territory following advice of a similar rise in the coast refinery list, together with strength in the eastern markets.

A year ago best cane was selling at \$6.50 per sack, remaining around that level during the month of April, then sagging to the \$6.30 level during May.

Top grade butter is higher on the exchange today with extras at 29 cents and standards at 28 1/2 cts. Ordinary butter is steady. There is a good demand for cubes, of all grades and the market has a general healthy tone.

No change is shown in quotations for the day although the market is in good steady position. Receipts yesterday totaled 1560 cases but moved into coolers promptly. Storage holdings now amount to 20,560 cases locally.

Warm weather and liberal holdings of poor quality calves is keeping the local veal market in a weakened condition. Receipts were not large today but the demand was very limited and 14 cents was the general top on calves.

SALES HELP TO HOIST WHEAT IN LATE DEALINGS

CHICAGO, Apr. 15. (AP)—Big export sales exceeding 1,250,000 bushels helped to hoist the wheat market rapidly today, especially in the late dealings. The market developed into a broad affair with heavy general buying that readily absorbed profit taking sales. It was contended that Chicago July delivery is the cheapest wheat in the world, and that this market is on a shipping basis to Liverpool, even by all-rail to New York.

Wheat closed strong.

Market Developing Further Weakness

NEW YORK, Apr. 15. (AP)—Further weakness developed in today's stock market with some of the selling undoubtedly inspired by recurrent reports of a slowing up

of various lines of industry and retail trade probably due, in part, to unseasonable weather in many sections of the north. Trading was relatively light and largely of a professional character. The selling represented largely the operations of bear trading without indications of urgent liquidation

which characterized the market last month. The closing was firm. Total sales approximated 1,400,000 shares.

French Franc Reaches New All-Time Low Mark

PARIS, Apr. 15. (AP)—The French franc today sank to a new low level for all time. The official closing quoted it at 29.61 to the dollar and 142.80 to the pound.
