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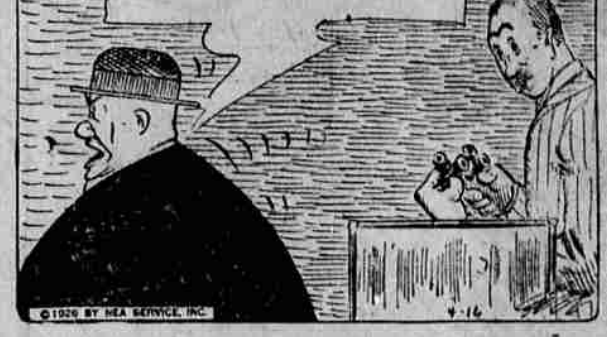

Tom Mix evidently is reaching beyond straight western pictures

for more fields to conquer, for he has given us recently "Dick Turpin," which was a story of England's famous medieval bandit, and now, in his latest release, "The Lucky Horseshoe," which opened at the Star theater last night, he gives us something else that is different from the old-time, stereotyped "westerns."

While "The Lucky Horseshoe" may be classed as a "western-plus," it is the "plus" part that holds the element of surprise and delight for the Mix fans.
