Mr. and Mrs. Richard Burnett and children spent Sunday at the home of Mrs. Burnett's sister, Mrs. Hannah Anson, here.

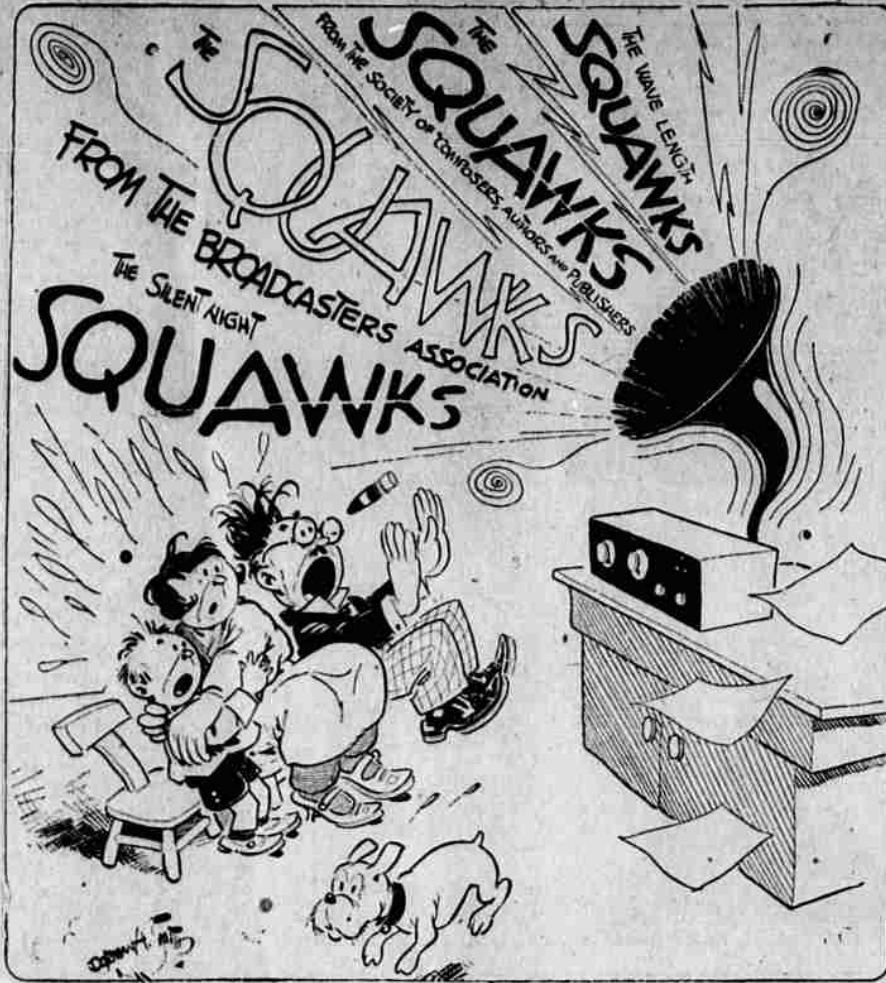
Bert Hill was a visitor to La Grande last week.

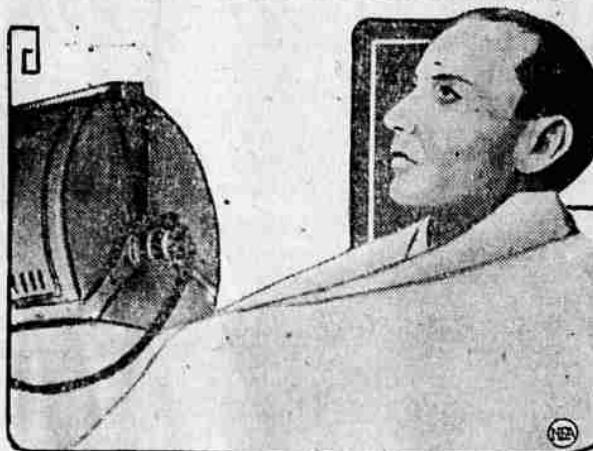
HOTEL INTEREST SOLD
