With his passing The Observer loses a valued and faithful worker, a keen and active mind, a kind and loyal friend. No one who has been a part of the paper's organization during the past fifteen years contributed as much to the success of its enterprise, to the soundness of its business policy, to the excellence of its service as did Mr. Moran. His was the guiding hand in the business side of the paper for many years and his energy and devotion are in a very large measure responsible for the advertising volume and following attained in the last few years.

Seldom in an organization is there found the faithful service that was rendered by Mr. Moran to The Observer. And seldom is such service rendered under the handicap that he suffered in the last two years—that of total blindness. Only the great strength of character that was his, only the cheerful, kindly devotion that it possessed, would have permitted his keeping steadfastly at work up until he was stricken. The same loyalty and the same ability that was given for so many years to the former owner, Mr. Dennis, has been evidenced during the last year under the present ownership. His service was to an institution, and The Observer has lost a true friend and noble associate.

As he was a valued and conscientious employee, so was Mr. Moran a valued and conscientious citizen, a good and kind father and husband. He was a thorough Christian gentleman and his life may well be a source of pride to his family, his relatives and friends. Although they and we now mourn him and will long remember his friendliness, his glad smile, his cheerful greeting, yet his passing brings rest and peace to a physical being that has endured more than its share of handicap and suffering. He would not have wished to endure it longer. O. E. Moran was ready to go. He had run a good race; he had fought a good fight. Properly and truthfully can it be said, "Well done, thou good and faithful servant. Enter thou into the joy of thy Lord."
