Wide as candidates the name of Rose E. Barrett, of Seaside, former city manager of Warrenton, was put on the list yesterday. She filed no platform except a simple statement pledging her efforts to the public weal.

Hert E. Haney, late of the United States shipping board, filed yesterday as a candidate for the democratic nomination for United States senator, and will contest with Elton Watkins. Both are of Portland. Sargent K. Brown, an Indian of Clifton, Klamath county, attempted to file by petition by last night but had not submitted a completed petition and his name probably will not be on the ballot.

**Congressional Candidates.**  
 For representative in congress W. C. Hawley and N. J. Sinnott stand alone on the republican side in the first and second districts and the democrats have put forth no candidates. In the third district, Multnomah county, Mulkey got in the top, yesterday and will compete with Norman K. Richards and Maurice E. Crumacker, incumbent, for the republican nomination.

Whoever wins the republican nomination will contest for the seat in November with Joseph K. Carson Jr., who has filed as the democratic aspirant in the third district.

No republican candidates for governor have appeared. Up to now Patterson and Carter are the aspirants. Louise Palmer Weber filed yesterday as a candidate against Governor Pierce for the nomination.

"Deep water" George Sheppard seeks the supreme court bench filing yesterday to compete for the republican nomination with Chief Justice McBride and Justices Bean and Brown, with three to nominate. The democratic side is vacant.

For state school superintendent the republican have five in the race, the democrats two.

State Labor Commissioner C. H. Gram will have democratic opposition in November in G. A. Von Schantz, of Portland, and Public Service Commissioner T. K. Campbell, unopposed for the nomination, will compete with Clyde T. Spooner, democrat.

In the fourth judicial district, Multnomah county, competition is strong for the republican nomination for circuit judge for department this city their home. They are moving into the house on 323 Main avenue.

## 375 FLOW OF LAVA IS CONTINUING

HILO, T. H., Apr. 17. (AP)—Terrifying, roaring explosions marking the sinister advance of two lava flows from Mauna Loa continued throughout the night while the molten rock made its progress toward the sea, leaving in its wake a memory of the Catholic church, a residence and a great forest of tropical trees and vegetation besides obliterating a large section of the highway which is the only means for entering the island.

Hundreds of tourists flocking from Hilo to watch the spectacle presented the island police force with a difficult problem to keep persons from becoming marooned by the flows.

Souvenir hunters are being scorched. Large groups of the volcano's audience found themselves isolated when lava flows crossed the roads, necessitating their traveling more than a hundred miles to return to the city. Communication with the western side of the island was cut off when the rivers of lava wiped out telephone poles.

Thus far, rooms for 200 delegates have been offered. That leaves 100 women still to be arranged for, and the time is getting short.

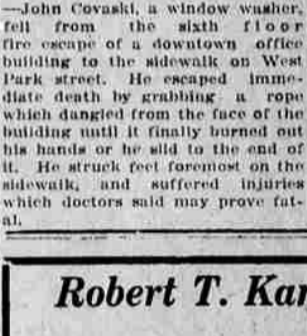
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## FALLS SIX STORIES

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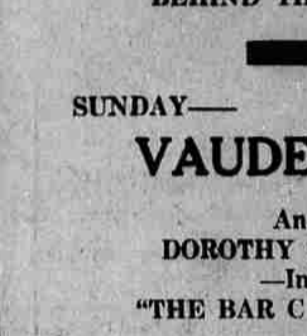
