Dr. Engeset Is Lutheran Pulpit Guest

Zion Church Will Have
First Services in Several
Weeks Under Portland
Visitor.

The first divine services in many weeks will be conducted at the Zion Lutheran church Sunday morning, with the Rev. Andrew Engeset, pastor of the Church of the Redeemer, at Portland, as the guest speaker.

Lee Gregory, a young man of this community who has felt a call to the ministry, will deliver the evening service at the Church of the Nazarene. Other features of tomorrow's church program include an inspirational address by Dr. Henry W. Parker, who has been this week at the midyear meeting of the foreign missionary society in Portland, and a sermon in answer to the question, "Where Are the Dead?" by the Rev. C. V. Dunn at the Central Church of Christ in the evening.

Zion Lutheran
Mr. Engeset is said by Lutherans here who have heard him at convention to be a forceful speaker. With his visit to Zion church tomorrow, the pulpit will be occupied for the first time since the Rev. Mr. Trojan came from Astoria several weeks ago to address a possible future congregation. The former pastor, the Rev. William F. Holl, resigned to go to Bellingham, Wash., when the climate here proved unsuitable for Mrs. Holl's health.

Sunday school will be at 9:45 a. m. as usual. The Luther league will take charge of the evening service at 7 o'clock.

Church of the Nazarene.
At the 11 o'clock hour of worship, the pastor, the Rev. L. D. Moeggers, will speak on "The Blessed Privilege and Sacred Duty of All Who Are Identified with the Visible Church." There will be a special service of prayer and anointing of the sick.

Church of Christ, Scientist.
The subject of the morning service at the First Church of Christ, Scientist, tomorrow at 11 a. m. will be "The Doctrine of Atonement." Sunday school will be at 9:45 a. m.

First Methodist
Dr. Parker announces that his subject for 11 a. m. Sunday will be "The World Contacts of the Church." Special music is being prepared by the choir. Sunday school will be at 9:45 a. m.

At 7 p. m. the Epworth league will meet. Evening worship will start at 8 o'clock. The theme will be "What Is Worthwhile in Life, and How It is Obtained?"

"Can we go to daily vacation Bible school again this year?" The interest extends to all parts of the city. And reports from the mothers interviewed indicate that the youngsters are already eager for the stories, the handcraft and the character talks to begin again.

"My two little girls in the school last year are counting the days, and their brother, who has heard them talk so much about the things they did, is rejoicing that he will be old enough to get into the new beginner's department this summer," said Mrs. J. G. Stitzinger.

Learned Right From Wrong
"They seem to remember so well the missionary stories they were told. And I really think the lessons in right and wrong made a lasting impression on them. Everything was put to them so directly and so simply that they understood what it was about."

"My older daughter, Juanita, was positively elated at learning to darn. She still mends her stockings neatly and takes a great deal of pride in knowing how."

Mrs. R. W. Leighton, who had a son in the school at the Presbyterian church and was herself superintendent of the primary department there, has pledged her help again this year. Adam Leighton will not attend, since he is ready for high school next fall, but his mother feels that the Bible school is such a force for good that she wants to continue as a teacher.

Want to Go Again
"I think it's one of the finest things that ever happened in La Grande," declared Mrs. Paula Gehring, who had a son and a daughter, Frederick and Marion, in the Greenwood division of the school last year.

"The things they learned have stayed with them all year. They still talk about stories and handwork that they learned there, and they are anxious to know if they are going to have another Bible school this year."

Mrs. Gehring also was a teacher in the school, working under Mrs. John Camp. Mrs. Camp has agreed to help again this summer.

Parade Full of Thrills.
There were other things that meant a great deal to the children besides the stories and handcraft. The picnic was probably the most successful outing that 500 or 600 youngsters ever had. The demonstration program made them feel grownup and important. As for the parade, it gave the whole community a chance to thrill with pride in La Grande's first daily vacation Bible school. The second one will be even better, the cabinet says.
