Baker Defeats Tigers In Last-Minute Rally

Champion Track Team, with Sherwood III, Is Nosed Out by the Bulldogs Saturday 75 1/2 to 71 1/2

With Sherwood showing the effects of illness and unable to take more than two starts the Baker Bulldogs upset the dogs Saturday afternoon and won—75 1/2 to 71 1/2—on the La Grande Eastern Oregon champion track and field team in a sensational, last-minute rally in this relay.

Before the relay, which Baker won, La Grande led by a single point.

Sherwood, who took first in the shot and discus, made no points in any other event. When in condition he is La Grande's fastest sprinter and low hurdler and usually good for from 15 to 25 points.

McCord High Point Man

McCord, Baker flash, was high point man of the meet with 26 while Zundel, La Grande, came next with 15. McCord won the dashes, low hurdles and broad jump. Zundel took second in the 100-yard dash, first in the high hurdles, second in the 220-yard dash and tied with Lyman for first in the high jump.

Smutz time in the quarter mile was the outstanding mark of the day. The Eastern Oregon record, set by Clark Price, is 53 1-5 seconds, but Smutz clipped off the distance in 55 flat.

Days' time in the half mile, 2 minutes 5 2-5 seconds, was creditable and Keown's 142 feet 2 inch javelin mark elicited much praise.

Baker took an early lead in the first six events but from then on La Grande forged ahead.

Summing it up, Baker was weak in the field events while La Grande was strong on the track.

Next Saturday Pendleton will meet the Tigers here.
