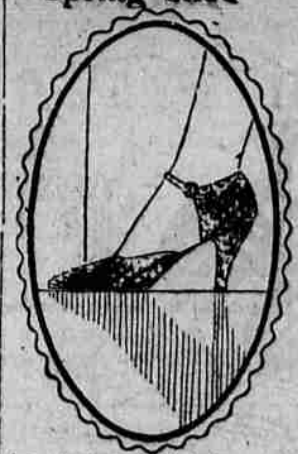

Scarf Now Used As Sash

NEW YORK (AP)—The newest use to which that staple of fashion, the scarf has been turned, is that of sash. A spring sport dress in two pieces, in white or a pale color, utilizes a bright colored scarf to tie about the wearer's hips, and hold the blouse neatly in place, no matter what the evolutions of the sport.

MONTE CARLO (AP)—The days of bright colored footgear are past. Royal blue still is permissible, but green and red are only admitted as trimmings. Light and discreet shades now are the vogue.

The colors most favored in kid footwear are beige, opal and a lighter silver gray, parchment, sauntere, Hugby tan and mahivette. Black is rarely seen except in patent leather, when the shoe generally is a plain pump. Combined with white (black patent vamp and deep trim of white kid) it is more frequent.

NEW YORK (AP)—With street dresses from fourteen to eighteen inches above the floor, the period evening dress still trails its way about the smart haunts of New York's night life.

Luscious shades of taffeta, periwinkle blues, crushed raspberries, spruce greens, yellows, shape the enormous skirts of the robe de style. Clusters of flowers ornament its prim waistline, and old lace or tulle bands its demure neck.

A new feature of the period evening dress is its slanting hem line, touching the floor in the back, rising to show several inches of ankle in the front.

NEW YORK (AP)—The pearl necklace refuses to be downed as the most fashionable accessory to every type of feminine dress.

Fashion experts have tried to substitute crystals, or the gold necklet, now linked and called the slave necklet. Ladies of fashion stick to pearls. Long strings of baroque pearls they choose for

daytime wear, short strings, or several strands for evening.

A new pearl necklace is that in five strands, fastened with a single clasp. To fit this, a new neck-line has been introduced—a high back, and a deep V in the front.

LONDON (AP)—One of the most favored "extras" articles of attire amongst society women is the scarf. It is being worn in all colors and sizes to match evening gowns, afternoon frocks, walking suits and motoring outfits.

When not composed of the same material as the garment with which it is worn, it is made of heavy crepe de chine or soft suede. Usually it is from six to ten inches wide and worn with ends over the left shoulder and front of the dress.
