WHEAT MARKET SLUMPS TODAY

CHICAGO, Apr. 19. (AP)—Heavy profit taking sales weakened the wheat market today after prices had soared to 10c a bushel above last week's lowest level. Forecasts of warmer weather and of needed moisture for the spring crop in the northwest helped to bring about the reaction. Bidders cash buyers here started to selling May wheat, and in some quarters the inference was drawn that this selling might be applied purchases of wheat in the northwest to be brought here.

Wheat closed irregular at one cent net decline to 10c advance; corn 1/4 to 1/2c off, and oats 1/4c down.

CHICAGO, Apr. 19. (AP)—The wheat opening quarter cent off to 10c net up. May, now \$1.67 1/2 to \$1.68 1/2, and July \$1.44 1/2 to \$1.45 1/2, was followed by a further net back in some cases and then by a general rise that carried May to \$1.70 1/2 and July to \$1.46 1/2.

(AP)—The Eastern Oregon Light and Power company, of Baker, reports operating revenues of \$379,548.45, and increase of \$324,839.55 over the previous year; operating expenses of \$295,812.47, a decrease of \$30,261.55; and a net income of \$111,761.45, an increase of \$248,625.00.

Butter Drops 2 Cents In Portland Markets

PORTLAND, Ore., Apr. 19. (AP)—Print butter is two cents lower today at 41 cents creamery tins with cartons at 42 cents. At the same time local creamery men have reduced their bids 2 cents on butter fat. New prices are 20 cents for shippers' track and 41 cents delivered Portland.

Several sales of butter have been consummated at the 21 cent level.

NEW YORK, Apr. 19. (AP)—Robert H. Gary, chairman of the United States Steel corporation today notified stockholders at their annual meeting in Holoboken, N. J., that no stock dividend could be safely declared at this time but indicated that such a payment was possible in the future.

Renewed Weakness Is Seen in Wall Street

NEW YORK, Apr. 19. (AP)—Renewed weakness developed in today's stock market after an earlier period of strength during which prices showed a tendency to break out of the narrow trading area within which they have been fluctuating for three weeks. Heavy selling of United States Steel common, reflecting speculative disappointment at the positive stand taken by Chairman Gary against the payment of higher dividends at this time, and enormous duplication of Armour issues unsettled the market.

The closing was irregular. Total sales approximately 1,100,000 shares.

SENATE URGES BID REJECTION

WASHINGTON, Apr. 19. (AP)—The senate today adopted a resolution calling for the rejection by the shipping board of the bid of R. Stanley Dollar for the purchase of Admiral-Donner-Donner S. line.

The resolution, offered by Senator McNary, republican, Oregon, was adopted unanimously without discussion or a roll call. It charged that the shipping board had voted to accept the \$14,500,000 bid of Dollar and failed to open a higher offer made by another bidder.

If Dollar obtains the line, the resolution said, the Dollar interests should have a monopoly of the shipping on the Pacific and would operate the line to the detriment of the northwest and particularly the port of Seattle as their interests were in California.

Captain Estevez Will Continue His Flight

MAURITIA, Apr. 19. (AP)—His career escape from death in the Syria desert has failed to daunt Captain Estevez, commander of the Spanish flying expedition to Manila. A dispatch received today from Amman, where he and his mechanic are recuperating from their experience, says: "After recovering, I shall continue the flight."

INDIAN FILES DAMAGE SUIT

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Apr. 19. (AP)—Alleging that Peter Seuchin, Klamath and Modoc Indian, has filed suit for \$45,000 against E. L. Elliott, Klamath county prosecutor.

The complaint sets forth that the Klamath and Modoc Indians are a lawful and peace-loving people and that Elliott, for political motives, made a great outcry concerning matters which would have been adjusted in due course and which did not merit the publicity given them.
