WHEAT PRICES LOWER TODAY

CHICAGO, Apr. 20. (AP)—Wheat prices underwent a sharp decline in the late dealings today. Reports were at hand that wheat shipments from Duluth and Minneapolis have been arranged for delivery on May contracts here. Houses with eastern connections were heavy sellers, apparently to realize profits on account of the big advance of late. Besides, show-ers were forecast for the Dakotas and Minnesota, and it was indicated spring weather had been making rapid progress on both sides of the international line.

Wheat closed unsettled 1/4 to 20 net lower.

Opening prices 1 to 15c higher. May, new \$1.05 1/2 to \$1.09 and July \$1.45 1/2 to \$1.49 were followed by a material further advance and then by a reaction in which part of the gains were wiped out.

Main Price Movement Upward in Wall Street

NEW YORK, Apr. 20. (AP)—Further irregularity of the price movement developed in today's stock market, but the main price movement appeared to be upward with the local transactions, shipping and steel in the forefront of the advance. Trading in the general list was extremely dull. Total sales of the first three hours barely exceeded 500,000 shares.

The closing was strong. Trading became livelier in the final hours when large supplies of money were reported to be available below the official call rate. British activities were roused with vigor in several specialties carrying Pullman up six points, Du Pont 4 and General Electric, May stores, Case Threshing Machine and Chicago Pneumatic Tool 2 to 2 1/2 points. Total sales approximately 900,000 shares.

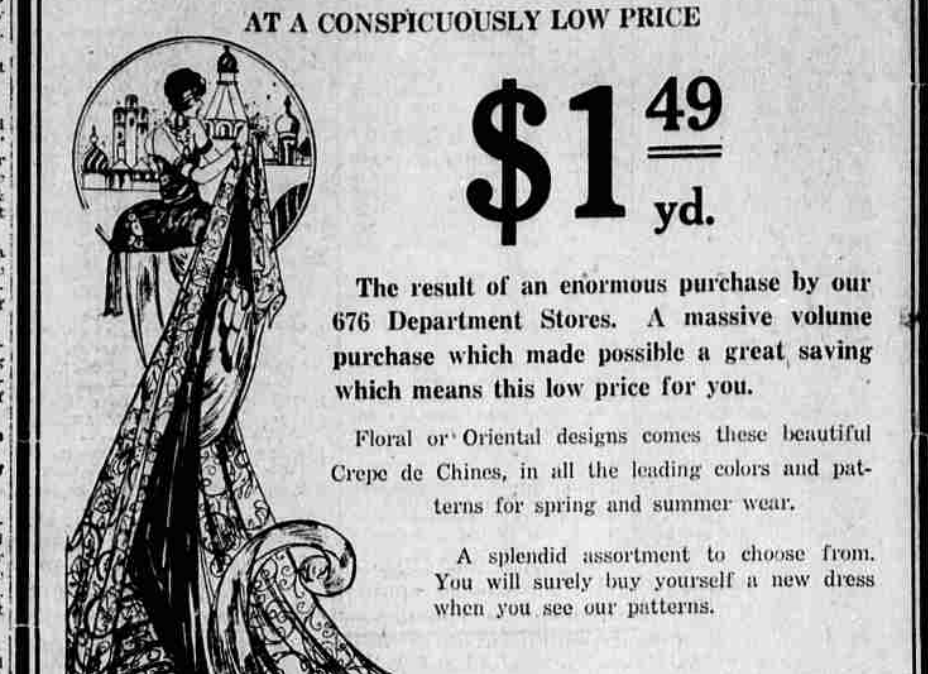

Egg Values Easier in Portland Market Today

PORTLAND, Ore., Apr. 20. (AP)—Egg values are slightly easier in the local market with fresh standard and extra off a cent and current receipts a half cent for the day. Exchange quotations on extras 26c; firsts 24c; mediums 23c and current receipts 24c.

Receipts were only moderate over the week end due to the stormy weather. A total of 918 cases were reported yesterday. Storage holdings are up to 22,977 cases, showing a gain of 877 cases.

No new developments are shown in the butter market since the decline in prints yesterday. There is still a brisk shipping outlet to the south for good cubes and prices held steady on the exchange.

Creamery men are now paying 43 cents for fat with cubes at 39 cents. The make yesterday amounted to 17,443 pounds with cube receipts amounting to 24,125 pounds.

PORTLAND MAN FOUND DEAD

SALEM, Ore., Apr. 20. (AP)—Henry Kilmer, of Portland, about 69 years old, was found dead in his room at a rooming house this morning. The condition of the body, which had fallen between his trunk and dresser, indicated that he had died late Monday afternoon. The body was clad only in a pair of trousers, the remainder of clothing being on the bed, which had not been turned down. Death is believed due to natural causes.

ions with which other countries are faced. We would naturally welcome any steps which other powers might take toward the limitation of land armament; we shall be glad if we can at any time exert a helpful influence in this direction.

"The situation in China has to be viewed," the secretary said, "in the perspective of that country's history." He declared the course of the Washington government throughout China's troubles had been "consistent and definite" in purpose.

Adhere to Policies.
As to the treaty situation between the United States and Turkey, Mr. Kellogg said there had been no departure from the traditional typical American policy. Referring to the pending Lausanne convention, he said criticism directed against this treaty was "negative."

The secretary referred at length to the arbitration and mediation negotiations undertaken by this government to adjust the Tacna-Arica disputes between Chile and Peru. He reminded the audience, particularly the Latin-American journalists present as guests of The Associated Press, that the true policy of this country contained "no desire for imperialism, acquisition of territory, political or economical domination."
