KING GEORGE, OF ENGLAND, AGAIN A GRANDFATHER

LONDON, Apr. 21. (AP)—The Duke and Duchess of York are the proud possessors of a girl baby. The little princess made her advent into the world at 2:45 o'clock this morning in the childhood bedroom of the duchess in the town house of her father, the Earl of Strathmore. The baby is a first child.

The duke of York is the second son of King George and Queen Mary. The duchess was formerly Lady Elizabeth Bowes-Lyon. The couple was married in Westminster Abbey April 26, 1923.

Popular interest, second only to that which attended the arrival of the first baby of Princess Mary, daughter of the king and queen and her husband, Viscount Lascelles, long had been focused on the expected event. There was much gratification on the part of the people to learn from the official announcement that the duchess "has been safely delivered of a princess."

The baby arrived a little earlier than had been expected by the physicians, who did not anticipate the occurrence until the end of the month. The Duke of York was present in the Strathmore home and received hearty congratulations. Recently the duchess has been in remarkably good health. She accompanied the duke to the theater a few days ago.
